Fred H. Foster, attorney for the Yellowstone bank of Billings, was in Lewistown several days the past week looking up some real estate matters in the county offices.

But once since the summer schedule went into effect on the Great Falls stage line has the mail arrived on time, but its reaching here the same day that it is due is such a great improvement over last winter's experience that the citizens are hardly inclined to protest.

Owing to the severe storms in Cascade county last week, the telephone line was out of repair for about 24 hours and it was impossible to secure any war news Saturday evening. The Sunday report was expected under great difficulties, for the same reason.

Camille Hogue having just completed the erection of a stone and brick store building east of Bertrand & Hopkins, has now begun work on another and the three will make a handsome business block. The new buildings adjoin and are 25 foot front, 75 feet deep and one story high, entirely fireproof.

The general impression seems to be that the soldier boys who go to the Philippine islands will be absent from home about two years, for though hostilities will probably cease long before that period has expired, the garrisoning of the islands will be necessary for a considerable time.

William Hortop, one of the oldest citizens of this county, and familiarly known as "Uncle Billy," has seen all three of his sons, Russell, Fred and Almon, offer their services to their country in the present conflict. The former went with company I and the two latter to Billings to join the cavalry. While opposed to their all leaving, Mr. Hortop was prevailed upon to give his consent, and is now left alone.

Saturday noon four troopers left Lewistown for Billings to join the cavalry troop which will leave Billings this week to become a part of Col. Grigsby's regiment of rough riders. They were Fred and Almon Hortop, Al Lumsden, August Schiller and Gus Scheibelhut. The boys had received a telegram from Capt. Bond of the Billings cavalry that places would be reserved for them up to Monday night. They were given a hearty cheer as they rode out of town.

The Lewistown mail coach and ten sacks of mail were "insoak" Monday night. This state is not unusual for the coaches, but seldom is the mail in such straits. Surprise creek, seven miles west of Stanford, was on "a tear" and had washed out the bridge. In the darkness the coach got in and could not get out. Eight hours later the coach and mail were extricated from their watery bed and sent on its journey. It will probably arrive today, considerably the worse for its experience.

J. L. Stuart is acting as deputy county assessor and has been in the western end of the county for a fortnight. At the June meeting of the board the commissioners are expected to provide for the appointment of successors to Assessor Croft and County Attorney Cheadle, should those officers not have returned within the sixty days allowed by law, and this does not seem at all probable. Judge DuBose will probably appoint F. E. Smith to act as prosecuting attorney, when court convenes June 6th.

G. M. Stafford last week sold his residence property on the Boulevard, corner of Fifth avenue, to L. W. Eldridge. This property is about the finest in town, being surrounded by a handsome lawn and trees and having private water facilities which provide water for the house and irrigating purposes and of a better quality than in any well in the city. Mr. Eldridge will take possession September 1st. During the summer Mr. Stafford will build a residence more suited to his needs and hopes within two years to own a finer residence property than that which he has now sold. The terms of the sale are private.

E. S. Cook, of the Montana Well Drilling Co., was in Lewistown Monday. The company has just completed the drilling of a well for Ed. Morris at Uta, being the first experiment in the Basin. The drilling was through gravel and sand rock for 45 feet without obtaining any water, but when they had reached a depth of 51 feet water rose 31 feet in the casing and the well was pronounced a success. Mr. Morris was so well pleased that he has engaged the company to sink another 50 feet and hopes to obtain flowing water. The next job is at C. M. Belden's where there are two wells to drill. From there the company will move to John Raw's and other points near Philbrook and then come to Lewistown, where they will sink a well for David Hilger. The size of the Morris well is six inches in diameter, the casing following the drill all the way.


