REMAINS RECOVERED.

The Murderers Destroy Their Victims by Fire.

The bodies, or rather the remnants of the bodies of Farquar McRae and John Allen, killed on the Musselshell two weeks since, have been found. They were almost destroyed by fire, but still enough is left to make it certain that the bones are all that is left of the two victims.

Jeff Sherman and assistant dragged the Musselshell thoroughly, but without result. Later they found, at a point one-half mile above the Hude cabin on the river, which is 40 miles below the Musselshell Crossing, the evidence of the burning of the bodies. A few bones, some scraps of clothing, buttons, and a portion of the bowels of a human being were found among ashes and embers. In the river near by was found a considerable number of bones, showing that after all possible had been burned the remainder had been thrown into the river. Deputy Sherman is expected in Lewistown tonight and will probably bring the remains with him.

It will be recalled that James Calder and Fisher stated that Billy Calder had left them, taking the bodies with him in the wagon, and driven up the river, rejoining them in about three hours, but without the bodies. Their supposition was that he put the bodies in the river. From later conversation with the two younger boys it has been learned that after rejoining his companions Billy Calder left them to make camp and drove the sheep up the river, and repeated this the next morning. circumstances it is now believed that the elder Calder boy, who was, without doubt, the prime mover in the terrible crime, started the fire upon his first trip and his later visits were to rekindle the flames and to scatter the bones.
