CONVENTION DELEGATES.

Well Attended, Enthusiastic Primaries Send Honorable Party Leaders to Name the Nominees.

So far as heard from the Republican primaries held throughout the county Saturday were better attended than in any previous year, and while there were interesting contests in several of the precincts the battle everywhere was good-natured and indicative of a sweeping success on November 6th. At Philbrook, for instance, C. M. Goodell said Saturday evening that the attendance at the primary there was considerable larger than in any year before, and that everyone seemed desirous of promoting success all along the line. At Gilt Edge, when inquiry concerning the result was made by wire as late as 7:30, the judges had not yet finished counting the votes.

So far as candidates are concerned little seems to have been definitely settled by the elections Saturday, though without doubt some aspirants feel more secure than a few days ago.

There appears to be a very general desire for J. D. Waite to take the legislative nomination with W. A. Hedges. A new and formidable candidate for commissioner has arisen in the person of A. C. Green, of Utica.

For clerk of the court Edmund Wright appears almost certain of re-nomination, but A. T. Harvey is still in the race. C. M. Kelly, for clerk, has no opposition.

For sheriff G. W. Cook appears to have a strong following, while W. H. Woods is considered by many to have the lead, with scattering votes for C. A. Bidell and R. W. Noble.

Donald Fowler claims his renomination for assessor. The Utica delegation will urge the nomination of E. F. Hersey and E. P. Chandler has support.

The Gilt Edge delegation is going to make a big fight for Norman Poland for treasurer and will also present J. B. Washburn for commissioner. The Stanford delegation comes instructed for J. M. Croft for treasurer and wise ones in Lewistown predict his nomination. J. L. Stuart is also known to have friends among the delegates chosen.

That O. W. Belden will be named for attorney and Miss Peebles renominated for superintendent of schools there is little doubt, while Chairman Phillips, of the board of county commissioners, is practically assured of being chosen to succeed himself.

The Garnett delegations is first, last and all the time for Wm. Neill for commissioner and that gentleman will have other strong support on the first ballot.

E. K. Cheadle will be unanimously indorsed for the judgeship nomination in this district and the delegation, which will go to the state convention, will be unanimous for F. E. Smith for attorney general.

Delegates are expected to arrive early and the caucus the evening before will, without doubt, be the scene of earnest rivalry. Unless signs fail the convention will be the most enthusiastic ever held in the county. It will be convened at the court house Saturday at 10 a. m.

FULL STOMACHS.

Their Value in Fitting Men to Decide Deliberately and Wisely.

James Creelman in a special report of the Republican national convention which he sent to the New York Journal characterized the speech of Senator Wolcott as "a speech based upon the theory that a man with a full stomach ceases to think about principles." The trouble with Mr. Creelman is that he fails to take into consideration the fact that one of the chief principles held by American civilization is that social and industrial conditions should be such that men shall have full stomachs.

Men with full stomachs are worth more than men with empty stomachs. They think better, they are better fitted and more ready to stand by their principles than they would be when suffering from the pangs of hunger. Therefore a fundamental question to be determined in deciding for or against a political party is whether or not the policy it advocates will enable the people of the United States to secure that with which to fill their stomachs and to supply themselves with the necessities of life.

This is why it is that the tariff issue on which our material condition hinges has been the most prominent issue before the American people since the beginning of the government. And we have made the glorious record in the world's history, which we have made because the American people have, by adhering almost constantly to the policy of protection, secured for themselves such industrial conditions that they have had all the material comforts of life, have thus been relieved from personal worry and discomfort and have therefore been in a position to give their best thought to the great problems before the country.

Because the American people have, thanks to the Dingley law, full stomachs this year, they will more wisely decide questions of national policy. But Mr. Creelman and the New York Journal may rest assured that they will not begin by voting for the policy of free trade, which will give them empty stomachs instead of full ones.
