

QUARANTINE PROCLAIMED

Governor Toole Issues It Against Foreign Sheep on Recommendation of the Commissioners.

THE CONDITIONS AS IMPOSED

Animals Imported into Montana From Any Other State or Canada Must Undergo Inspection.

Helena, April 8.—Acting under authority of an act of the last legislature and upon the recommendation of the state board of sheep commissioners, made at its meeting in Helena last week, Governor Toole yesterday issued a quarantine proclamation governing the importation of sheep into the state of Montana from practically all the states and territories in the United States and the Dominion of Canada.

In making his proclamation, Governor Toole outlines the legislative act giving him the authority which he exercises, whereby it is made his duty, when he shall have reason to believe that any of the diseases mentioned in the act, or any contagious or infectious disease has become enzootic or epizootic in certain localities in any other state or territory, etc., to designate those localities and prevent further importation of sheep from them except under certain conditions.

Regulations in the Future. Hereafter, sheep imported into the state of Montana must be shipped to a point of starting, there placed in properly disinfected cars and shipped to their point of destination, where they will be quarantined and treated by a sheep inspector, under the direction of the state veterinary surgeon. When sheep are trailed into the state, the procedure will differ only in so far as it is necessary to meet the different conditions. In his proclamation the governor says:

"Whereas, I have reason to believe that conditions exist in the following named localities which render sheep when brought into this state likely to convey the disease known as 'scab' and other contagious or infectious diseases, it is hereby ordered that all sheep imported into the state of Montana from Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming and the Dominion of Canada, must when shipped into the state of Montana, be loaded at point of starting into properly disinfected cars or cars and be shipped in such properly disinfected cars or cars into this state, where, upon arrival at point of railroad destination in this state, such sheep must be immediately placed under the supervision of a sheep inspector or a deputy sheep inspector and by him be properly dipped, treated and quarantined under the direction of the state veterinary surgeon.

Duties of Owners. "When sheep are driven or trailed into the state of Montana, then the owner or person in charge thereof shall give due and sufficient notice of the expected arrival of such sheep at the state line and the point there on must be designated in the notice given to the state veterinary surgeon, and all such sheep must be dipped at the state line or point of entry into the state of Montana, as the state veterinary surgeon may direct. "The provisions of this proclamation shall only apply to sheep intended for detention or ownership within the state of Montana, and shall not apply to sheep in transit through the state by railroad when such sheep are accompanied by a health certificate issued by an inspector of the federal bureau of animal industry. "I hereby warn and direct all persons, companies and corporations importing sheep into the state of Montana to give due and sufficient notice to the state veterinary surgeon of the time of expected arrival of any such sheep into the state of Montana, which notice must be in the office of the state veterinary surgeon at least five days before such expected arrival."

LAND CONTEST CASES. Three Decisions Are Rendered by the Register and Receiver.

The local land office has rendered three decisions in contest cases, the first being in the case of Lovelock Hage against Vaclav Pulec. The land involved in this controversy is situated in section 2, township 15 north, of range 17 west. In his affidavit of contest, Hage alleged that Pulec had failed to establish an actual residence on the land, had placed no improvements upon it, and had wholly failed to cultivate the tract. The register and receiver, in their decision, say it is not the province of the department to settle disputes between litigants as to the ownership of improvements, to which both parties

in this case claim the ownership. They find that the claimant is in possession of the land and claims the house thereon and fencing. The contest was initiated five days after the expiration of the six months from the date of entry, and the allegation that the claimant had wholly failed to make improvements or cultivate the land is held to be premature. The contestant, according to the decision, did not establish that the claimant had failed to establish his residence on the land, and failed to make improvements thereon. In the case of Robert S. Todd against Levi B. Jewell, involving homestead entry No. 2851, the land being in section 71, township 4, north of range 16 east, the contestant alleged that the claimant had wholly failed to comply with the homestead law. This is sustained by the register and receiver, who recommend that the entry be cancelled.

A similar recommendation is made with regard to the homestead entry of Charles H. Dahl, No. 1957, the land being in section 15, township 15 north, of range 20 east. The contestant alleged that the claimant had failed to reside upon the land or cultivate it, as required by law.

ENGINEER IS KILLED.

Fatal Accident on the Northern Pacific at Central Park. Butte, April 8.—One man was killed and four injured in the explosion of the boiler of an engine attached to an eastbound freight train at Central Park, a small station on the Northern Pacific, about 100 miles west of Butte. The dead: Dan Gillis, engineer, of Livingston. Injured: Richard Kiney, of Livingston, fireman; may die. Everett Parks, assistant fireman; seriously.

Conductor Charles Bryant and Brake-man John Freeman were badly cut and bruised, though their injuries are not believed to be serious. Gillis' body was hurled through the air a distance of over 50 feet from the track, his mangled corpse being found beneath a mass of tangled wreckage. The engine was completely demolished, the firebox being driven several feet into the ground, tearing up tracks for a number of yards. A scarcity of water in the boilers is believed to have been responsible for the disaster.

Great Falls Tribune is Sold. Great Falls, April 7.—Announcement was made in the Tribune this morning of a change of ownership of that paper. It has been purchased by William M. Bole, of Bozeman, from W. G. Conrad and the new owner has taken charge. Mr. Bole was one of the proprietors and editor of the Tribune from January, 1895, until May, 1900, when the paper was sold to Senator W. A. Clark. Mr. Conrad purchased it from Senator Clark last October.

LOWEST PRICES INSPECTORS

Their Powers Are Defined by Attorney General Galen for Veterinarian Knowles.

A VERY IMPORTANT RULING

Interpretation of Laws Relating to Quarantine of Cattle Under Meat and Milk Inspection Act.

Helena, April 7.—"When it comes to inspecting cattle or other animals not intended for human consumption, or to the inspection of such animals as are intended for human consumption with the view of ordering any that might be seriously infected with disease to be slaughtered, the power rests wholly in the veterinarian or his duly appointed deputy."

This is the opinion of Attorney General Albert J. Galen, as expressed in a communication of State Veterinarian M. E. Knowles yesterday, in response to an inquiry from the latter official on the question of the powers of meat and milk inspectors—the opinion being one of the most important rendered by the attorney general since he took up the duties of the office.

The Opinion. The text of the opinion follows: "Yours of the 14th ult., requesting an opinion, duly received and considered. You state the meat and milk inspectors in Deer Lodge, Silver Bow and Cascade counties have in quarantine a number of cattle affected with tuberculosis, and you ask powers of such inspectors under the United States act should be made of these cattle; whether they can be held in quarantine in the future, and whether such inspectors, or yourself, as state veterinarian, have the right to brand such cattle, when condemned by a meat and milk inspector, or yourself, with the letter 'T' on the jaw, as provided by division 12 of circular eight of the Montana state veterinary department. "The meat and milk inspection law passed in 1903, provides for the appointment, by the president and secretary of the state board of health, and the state veterinarian, of meat and milk inspectors who shall be designated deputy state veterinarians. Sub-division four of such law provides that the rules and regulations and method of inspection adopted by the bureau of animal industry of the United States, supplemented by any rules which may be necessary by the aforesaid mentioned board, shall be taken as the standard of meat inspection. Section five provides that the meat and milk inspector shall have the right to condemn meat, carcasses, etc., or to condemn cattle, sheep or swine, etc., whenever the same are intended for food for human consumption.

Purpose of inspectors. "It is clear from the above sections, and in fact the language used in all the sections of such law defining the powers and duties of meat and milk inspectors, that they are appointed for the purpose only of inspecting meat and milk intended for food for human consumption, and while they are designated deputy veterinarians, their power as deputies is limited to the special work required of them under this law. Thus, under section five, they have the right, after examination, to condemn any meat, etc., or to condemn cattle, sheep, etc., and after the animals are slain they can destroy the meat by slaying the same with a knife and injecting kerosene therein, so as to make it impossible to be used for human consumption. Also, under such law and the rules adopted by the board under sections four and 21, they have authority to quarantine temporarily, all cattle intended for food or that are being milked for human consumption, in order that they may make the proper inspection of such cattle to ascertain if they are affected with tuberculosis.

"If it seems, however, that when the inspector has quarantined the cattle and made the necessary examination that all he can do is to condemn the meat, or the milk that might be taken from the cow, as unwholesome for human consumption, and under rule 12 of circular No. 8 of the Montana state veterinarian department, you or your deputy or inspectors have authority to brand on the jaw with an L or a T any cattle they find infected and have condemned. "Can Do No More. "More than this I do not believe they can do. When it comes to inspecting cattle or other animals not intended for human consumption, or to the inspection of such animals as are intended for food for human consumption with the view of ordering any that might be seriously infected with disease to be slaughtered, the power rests wholly in the state veterinarian or his duly appointed deputy, under section 3,018, of the political code, as amended by the laws of 1901, page 129. Under section 3,001, as amended by the laws of 1905, and sections 3,004 and 3,005, of the political code, the state veterinarian has authority to quarantine diseased animals and infected premises, and in case of an epidemic of disease, where premises have been previously quarantined by the veterinarian surgeon, he is authorized and empowered, when in his judgment necessary, to order the slaughter of any or all such diseased animals on such premises, and of all such animals as have been exposed to contamination or infection, under the restrictions provided in sections 3,005 and 3,006. "The state veterinarian, under his authority of direct supervision of inspectors, may inspect meat and milk and perform all other duties that are imposed by said law of 1903 upon meat and milk inspectors, and in addition he can perform all the duties required of him under sections 3,000 to 3,018, of the political code. On the other hand, meat and milk inspectors appointed by the board under the laws of 1903, cannot perform all the duties and have not the same authority that the state veterinarian and his duly appointed deputy have, their duty being limited to the carrying out of the special provisions and purposes of the meat and milk inspection law. The state veterinarian, having the same authority as the meat and milk inspectors, would have authority, in case the inspectors failed

to do so, to brand any infected animals in the manner provided by section 12 of circular No. 8.

When Quarantine Ends. "However, as stated above, whenever the meat and milk inspectors have established a quarantine for the purpose of ordering any animals to be inspected for disease, it would seem that the quarantine would end when they had completed their inspection and either condemned or given a certificate of good health of the animals quarantined, and if such animals were so infected with disease as to endanger other live stock in the state, it then becomes the duty of the state veterinarian or his duly appointed deputy to inspect such animals, establish permanent quarantine, if necessary, and if, in his judgment, he deems it necessary he may order such animals or any of them slaughtered in the manner provided by law.

"We are, therefore, of the opinion that the meat and milk inspectors are limited in authority as deputy state veterinarians, and whenever any examination by them is made in matters pertaining to the examination of meat and milk intended to be used for human consumption or of cattle intended to be killed, or milked, for human consumption, and whenever any examination, quarantine or other proceedings are had for the purpose of suppressing epidemic diseases in order to prevent the same from spreading among the live stock of the state, the sole power and authority to perform such duties is conferred expressly upon the state veterinarian.

"In all cases of contagious or infectious diseases among domestic animals or Texas cattle in this state, the veterinarian surgeon has authority to order the quarantine of the infected premises, as provided in section 3,001, as amended by chapter 38, laws 1905, and section 3,004, of the political code, and he must select the place where the stock must be quarantined, as provided in section 3,017; and in case such diseases become epidemic in any locality in the state he must establish quarantine or immediately notify the governor, who must establish quarantine by issuing a proclamation forbidding any animals of the kind among which said epidemic exists to be transported or moved from any locality without a certificate from the veterinarian surgeon showing such animals to be healthy. Such quarantine may continue as long as deemed necessary in the judgment of the state veterinarian. The expense of holding, feeding and taking care of the animals thus quarantined must be paid by the owner, agent or person in charge of the animals.

Need Not Order Slaughter. "Whenever the state veterinarian quarantines any premises, or whenever the governor issues a quarantine proclamation, upon receiving notice from the state veterinarian, it is not necessary that the veterinarian should thereupon issue an order for the slaughter of any or all of such animals, and such quarantine can be continued so long as the owners of such animals demand, or require, the state veterinarian to issue an order for the slaughter of any of such animals. He may simply establish the quarantine, or have the governor to establish it, and continue the same in force so long as he deems it necessary for the protection of the live stock of the state or any part of it; and any one who attempts to violate the quarantine can be punished as provided under sections 1,169 to 1,176, of the penal code.

"As to when animals in quarantine, or that are affected with contagious disease, should be slaughtered is a matter that rests wholly in the judgment of the state veterinarian, and while he may deem it necessary to have a quarantine established he does not have to order the slaughter of any of such animals unless in his judgment he thinks it necessary."
