**NEW CITY CLERK.**  
Mayor Pinkley Appoints William F. Smith to the Position.

Mayor Jesse Pinkley, complying with the action taken by the city council at its last regular meeting, yesterday appointed William F. Smith, of this city, as city clerk, and in addition Mr. Smith will serve as collector of water rates. He will give his entire time to these duties, and it is expected that the city will be much the gainer thereby, as the water department has grown to such an extent that services of a man are required all the time. This need will be greater after the gravity system is installed. So far, Mr. Smith has not decided whether he will make his office at the city hall or in some place that may be more convenient.

**A Real Estate Suit.**  
Dr. W. A. Long has brought suit in the district court against E. R. Needham, of Omaha, Neb., to require the latter to carry out an alleged contract to sell to the plaintiff the Hays ranch of 880 acres, near Garnett, together with the transfer of a desert entry and to recover \$1,000 damages. The plaintiff alleges that he entered into an agreement with the defendant for the purchase of the property and \$12,500 was fixed as the price. Negotiations were carried on by letter and wire, the plaintiff agreeing to pay \$5,000 down and give a note for the balance, the deed to be placed in escrow. It is alleged that when the terms had all been agreed to, the defendant refused to carry out the contract. Blackford & Blackford are the plaintiff's attorneys.

### PROTECTION FROM FIRE

PLAN OF CHIEF BEBB MEETS WITH APPROVAL OF ALDERMEN.

For several months past Fire Chief John C. Bebb has been urging upon the city council the necessity of providing the fire department with a team of horses to haul the hose cart to fires, pointing out that it requires much time for men to drag the cart to certain parts of the city, while the exertion takes all the life out of them. He has also impressed the mayor and aldermen with the importance of making quick runs, everything depending upon the speed with which the water is put on the flames in many instances. Chief Bebb's Plan.  
Mr. Bebb's plan, in brief, is to have a trained team of horses, with the patent harness, and to employ one man, who is to be at the hall all the time. With this accomplished he would put several cots in the hall, and arrange it so that several members of the volunteer department would sleep there, taking turns. This would provide the department with an ample force to man the apparatus at all times, and would greatly reduce the risk from fire. The council is apparently in favor of such a plan, and it has been referred to the committee on fire department. It is expected that this committee will very soon put in a report covering the whole matter, and that the plan, with possible modifications, but practically as outlined by the chief, will be carried out without delay.

### WEARING IN PROGRESS.

Warehouse Is Put in Shape to Receive Wool.  
Shearing is now in progress in various parts of the county, and within a few days the wool will begin to arrive at the warehouse, which has been placed in readiness to receive it. Baling will not begin, of course, until considerably later, when enough wool has accumulated to keep the crew steadily employed.

The recently long spell of cold, rainy weather did some damage to the flocks, but the losses of lambs were really smaller than might have been expected. The flockmasters, without exception, have been most successful with lambing, and Benjamin McDonald, of Garnett, is one who has broken his past record. He has more lambs by count than he has ewes, this result being due to the number of twin lambs born, and in two cases, ewes had triplets. But in addition to this, Mr. McDonald had good, dry sheds, and employed skillful men who gave the bands the best of care and attention, which counted for more than anything else.
