Voters Take Warning,

Attorney General Haskell has issued the following instructions to voters regarding the marking of ballots.

Electors must obtain their ballots from the judges of election. Care should be taken to see that each ballot bears the stamp "official ballot." Without this it wont be counted. The law does not allow the voter in any case to erase any name upon the ballot. The law requires the voting to be by x mark.

First, on receipt of his ballot the elector must forwith, without leaving the polling place and with in guarded rail provided and alone retire to one of the compartments provided, and prepare his ballot as follows. 1—If the voter shall desire to vote a straight party ticket he may do so by making a cross in the circle at the head of the list representing his political party. No other marks are necessary in such case; or, 2, he may omit the cross in the circle at the head of the ticket and make a cross opposite every person on his party list for whom he desires to vote. In voting a mixed ticket, he may omit the cross in the circle at the head of any list and make a cross opposite the name of every person on any list for whom he desires to vote; or, where there is only one candidate on each list for an office, for instance, sheriff, if the voter shall desire to vote for any candidate or candidates on any other list he may make a cross in the circle at the head of the list representing his political party and may make a cross on any other list opposite the name of any candidate for whom he desires to vote. In such case the cross at the head of the list of candidates shows the desire of the elector to vote a straight party ticket except that he desires vote for a candidate or candidates on any other list opposite whose name or names the voter has placed the cross; or, if there is more than one person to be elected for the same office, such as members of the legislature and commissioners, and the elector desires to vote for one or more of such candidates on any list other than his party list, he will vote as follows. (A). He may make a cross in the circle at the head of the list representing his political party and may paste the name of the person or candidate for whom he does not desire to vote over the name of one of such candidates on the list representing his political party for whom he does not desire to vote, and be

certain to make a cross opposite such pasted name; or B omit the cross from the circle at the head of the list representing his political party and place a cross opposite the name of each and every candidate or any party list for whom he desires to vote.

If no name of a candidate for an office appears upon his political party list, as for instance if no candidate for congressman is printed on the party list, the voter may vote for a person for any such office as follows. He may paste the name of the person for whom he desires to vote in the blank space left for the candidate's name in such list, and always in such case must make a cross opposite such pasted name; or he may write the name of the person for whom he desires to vote in the blank space left for the candidate's name in such list and always in such case must make a cross mark opposite such written name.

If the elector shall desire to vote the constitutional amendment he may do so by marking it with an x either for amendment to the constitution or against amendment to the constitution.

Any voter who by accident or mistake spoils his ballot may on returning said spoiled ballot receive another in place thereof.

After preparing his ballot the elector must told it so that the face of ballot shall be concealed and so that the "official ballot" stamp may be seen. A person offering to vote must hand his ballot to the judges and announce his name, and in cities and towns he must give the name of the street and location of his residence and number thereof. Any elector who by blindness or other physical disability is unable to mark his ballot but for no other cause, must upon request receive the assistance of two of the judges who shall represent different parties in the marking thereof, and such judges must certify on the outside thereof that it was so marked with their assistance and must thereafter given information regarding the same. In case an elector can not read or write the judges of election must not aid such elector in marking his ballot.

No person shall show his ballot after it is marked to any person in such a way as to reveal the contents thereof or the name of a candidate or candidates for whom he has marked his ballot.

No elector shall vote or offer to vote any ballot except such as he has received from the judges of election having charge of the ballots.
