### Swift Current Notes.

Messrs. Monteath, Martin and Van Senen of Browning visited the camp last week.

Frank Stevenson has a force of men at work on his property at the head of Appekunny basin. A force of men have also been put to work in the Iceberg Lake district.

Jas. D. Archer and others are working on the Ptarmigan, Frank Stevenson having charge of the work.

A barber shop has been opened up here, and now you can get a shave for 25 cents and a hair cut for 50 cents.

Several inches of snow fell Friday but has disappeared.

Pike fishing in the Dewey Lake is good, and several are being captured every day.

Parties from Minneapolis are expected about the 18th inst, who will investigate the Ptarmigan, and other properties, with the intention of taking hold of them.

A social entertainment was given at the Willow Creek school, on the reservation last Friday evening, in honor of Miss Hank's birthday, and several of our young people were invited to attend. The entertainment was under the management of Misses Hank, Stewart, Hill and Clark, who being dressed in white, presented a very attractive appearance, and who deserve the thanks of all present for their success in providing the means for the passing of a pleasant evening. The first number on the program was the well known spider web, which caused a great deal of amusement. After each had found his or her partner, a time was spent in social chat. Later on the observation table was the center of attraction, the the Snider orchestra produced a few musical selections, Miss Hank sang several solos to a piano accompaniment, and various games were played until the call for luncheon, which included ice cream, cake, strawberries, cherries, nuts, fruits and candies in abundance. Chas. E. Matson was mustered in as waiter, and performed his onerous duties with distinguished ability. After luncheon the time was passed very pleasantly, with vocal and instrumental music, until 2:30 a. m.—when the guests began to depart, well pleased at the success of the entertainment. ### A Philippine Drink.

"Beno" is the stuff which is knocking the American boys out in the Philippines. So says George Hobart, a regular, who has returned to his home in Cincinnati from Manila.

"It is not heat that is driving them crazy. It is just simply 'beno.' Hobart says absinthe is not in the same class. 'It looks like water and tastes like licorice,' he says, 'and when the boys can't get beer or whisky they buy 'beno' from the natives. It takes a pint of it to make a drinking man drunk. The third or fourth consecutive drunk makes a blooming idiot out of the victim. The soldiers crave it after they have once tasted it. Out on the lines the boys never get beer or whisky, and when the natives sneak the 'beno' into camp the fellows buy it.

"In the southern islands, where the demand is not so great, the natives sell it for three cents a canteenful, but around Manila the demand is so great that the price has been raised to 50 cents. After a man drinks about a pint of the stuff he begins to get silly, but he recovers in a day or two. Then he will want more of it, and if he can't get it he will go mad. Then the officers have to shackle him, and he is sent to the hospital for the insane at Washington. They tell me that the poor fellows who have been taken there will never get well."

Hobart reports that in the southern isles of the Philippine group "beno" is known as "tuba," and it is made out of coconut palm sap. The coconut tree is tapped near the top, and the natives put an empty coconut shell near the hole to catch the drippings. Hobart says: "Not long before I left Manila my company was sent to the firing line. One of the boys saw a coconut shell full of the sap in the top of a tree near by, and he made a dash for it. Before anyone could stop him he was in the top of that tree and had emptied the shell. The liquid took effect on his brain before he was ready to climb down, and we had a great time trying to get him out of the tree without letting him fall."

Hobart reports that the natives drink it only in moderation, and as a rule let it alone. He also says that when the government discovered the nature of the drink its sale was prohibited, and therefore the soldiers were compelled to buy it secretly, as it was subject to confiscation.


