### ANOTHER ASSASSIN.

John Seyssel, a Coal Miner, is Found on the Bank of Rock Creek Shot Through the Head.

No Cause Known for the Shooting.  
John Seyssel was found near the coal company's tippie this morning about six o'clock shot through the head. Robert McDonald came onto him as he was going home from work. When found he was alive but at this writing he has not been restored to consciousness. What the motive of the would-be assassin could have been is at present a mystery. Seyssel had over \$400 in greenbacks besides a watch on his person when brought to his cabin and certainly robbery was not the object. The shooting took place it is supposed about 7:30 o'clock last evening and the wounded man was lying at the time. It will be a miracle if he recovers. No arrests have yet been made.

**A PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.**  
Two Men Tried for Horse Stealing. Then Murphy Bound Over to Await the Action of the Grand Jury.  
Charles Conners Acquitted on Account of the Evidence Being Insufficient to Hold Him Over.

We published last week a local in regard to the arrest of Thomas Murphy and Charles Conners who were arrested for horse stealing.  
The case came up last Saturday and only one witness was examined on the part of the state and that was a young fellow by the name of Ed. Masser.  
The defendants in the case asked to have several witnesses subpoenaed on their behalf and the court adjourned until Monday at 10 o'clock to give the prisoners time to get their witnesses.  
Monday morning all the witnesses were promptly on hand when court was convened and the trial was resumed again.  
In the case against Thos. Murphy the first witness called was Edward Masser and he only reiterated statements that he had made on a former occasion. Several more witnesses were examined and from the evidence adduced the prisoner was held to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of five hundred dollars and in default of the payment of the same was taken to Livingston by Constable Edwin Patterson and lodged in jail.  
The trial of Charles Conners was next on the docket and was brought up and took up most of Tuesday before the court. Quite a number of witnesses were examined and it seems that the evidence adduced by the state was not of sufficient character to hold the man Conners.  
The stockmen of this section are getting tired of this stealing of stock and about the next outfit that is pulled up and the proof is good we are liable to have a new party. It looks as though it was almost impossible to convict a stock thief in Park county and after a time the people will take the law into their own hands and string the soundbreds that steal cattle and horses up like dogs. We do not favor the methods of stringing them altogether but the people have got to have some protection and if the law fails to protect them they will be forced to protect themselves. When a lot of hobos sweat that they will not work another day and make their boasts publicly, it is about time to commence to cross the rope and get it ready for a hanging bee. The people have several of this stripe spotted right now.
