# MONTANA RISES IN HER MAJESTY AND HER MIGHT!

## Political Bribery and Ballot Debauchery Stingingly Rebuked at The Polls by an Honest Electorate.

### SWEEPING REPUBLICAN VICTORY FROM GLENDIVE TO MISSOULA!

(Special Dispatch to The Picket.)  
Helena, Mont., Nov. 7.—Montana has gone republican by over 4,000 for Dixon and nearly 16,000 for Holloway, and in addition the party has a clear working majority in both branches of the state legislature. Speaking of the result of the election Senator Thomas H. Carter says:

"It is certainly very gratifying to note the splendid success of the republicans throughout the state. In the election of Dixon the people of Montana have secured a representative in congress who will, I am sure, prove active, energetic and faithful to the trust. The fact that he will be in sympathy with the administration will greatly aid Mr. Dixon in achieving results for the state at large and for the many citizens who find it necessary from time to time to appeal to the member of congress for assistance in the departments.

"Judge Holloway is a gifted, ambitious, upright young lawyer, whose career on the bench will certainly justify the splendid majority cast for him at the polls.

"In giving to the republicans a working majority in the legislature the people, while expressing their confidence in the party have imposed a weight of responsibility upon the members elect which I feel confident from my own knowledge of the men will be fairly discharged. The pledges of the party platform adopted at Great Falls will be redeemed in letter and spirit. The time has arrived for private axes to give way to public measures. If I read the temper of the members and senators-elect aright the lobby will find little comfort in the coming legislature and those having private axes to grind will probably do as well to leave them at home this trip. Judging by the character of the men who represent the majority it can be fairly predicted that the next legislative assembly will address itself soberly, prudently and patriotically to the task of serving the interests of all the people of the state as far as the legislative assembly can serve those interests. In this day of party triumph the old line republicans cheerfully extend the hand of goodfellowship to the old line democrats, populists and others who have joined the party ranks.

"The victory of the republican party throughout the nation is most pronounced for an off year election and voices the popular approval of the administration of McKinley and Roosevelt. This election but faintly forecasts the victory in store for the republican party in 1904."

From Judge Holloway's plurality there must be deducted the 750 plurality obtained by Judge Leslie in Cascade county. This makes the net plurality for Judge Holloway approximately 9,455.

Yellowstone County in Line.  
Billings, Nov. 5.—Confirmation of first reports will be necessary to de-

side the race for state senator and representative. The republicans claim the election of these offices by small majorities. Probably the greatest surprise of the election in the county was the defeat of Sam Deyert by G. F. Burla, democrat. The state republican ticket carries Yellowstone county by more than 300 majority. Evans, 557; Dixon, 814; Dec. 4; Sproule, 27; Leslie, 516; Holloway, 892; Cameron, 32; State senator—Grawell, democrat, 754; Negon, republican, 774. Representative—Beaver, republican, 746; Morse, democrat, 734. For sheriff—Hubbard, democrat, 849; Calhoun republican, 679. For treasurer—Burla, democrat, 825; Devorill, republican, 678. For county clerk—Fish, republican, 776; Carville, democrat, 697. For county attorney—Harris, republican, 877; Matheson, democrat, 678. For assessor—Evans, republican, 848; Lamotte, democrat, 619. Gallatin Divided.  
Bozeman, Nov. 5.—An accurate account of the returns from 22 precincts out of 26 shows the voting in Gallatin county for the state ticket to be as follows: Dixon, 1,043; Evans, 994; Holloway, 1,214; Leslie, 849.

Representatives, republican, Kidd, 958; Story, 1,035; Sales, 1,009; democrats—Martin, 984; Morgan, 964; Campbell, 777.

The returns from 22 precincts indicate that the republicans have secured all the county offices except assessor, surveyor, county superintendent of schools and one justice of the peace. The vote was: Sheriff—Fowler, rep., 1,132; Ferguson, dem., 998. Treasurer, Flanders, republican, 1,051; Blakeley, dem., 992; clerk and recorder, Cam-



erons will add only 10 or 15 votes to the total now in. The vote for clerk and recorder, and also for attorney, is close, but the democrats concede both offices by small majorities, giving the republicans the entire county ticket.

### LANDS AT PUBLIC AUCTION.

Register Long Will Conduct Sale of State Lands Next Tuesday.

Register Thomas D. Long of the state land office will arrive in the city next Monday to conduct a sale of state lands next Tuesday at 11 a. m. The lands will be offered for sale at the court house at public auction, the terms of purchase being that the purchaser shall pay 30 percent down and the balance in seven equal payments, drawing an annual interest of seven percent, these payments being secured within twenty-four hours after the sale by a penal obligation. If desired by the purchaser, he may pay the full amount down at the time. All lands not sold will be offered for lease for a term not exceeding five years at an annual rental not exceeding 6 1/2 percent of the appraised value. No lands can be sold for less than \$10 per acre and will only be disposed of in tracts of 160 acres to any one person, except they be grazing lands, in which event they may be purchased by the section.

Comprised in the list offered are a number of locations valuable for ranching purposes and an opportunity will be afforded of obtaining a fine tract of land at a cheap figure. Those who are occupying the lands offered for sale have a prior right to purchase them, and should be on hand at the sale, or they will be sold or leased to other parties.

New York, Nov. 5.—The election throughout the country resulted in substantial republican victories. The old-line republican states all rolled up their old-time majorities, and the states that some times are called doubtful gave good republican gains.

Mr. Odell has carried the state of New York by a safe majority. In Greater New York an immense plurality was rolled up for Mr. Cole, but the rural districts came to the republican rescue and Odell's election is assured. The returns from the congressional districts indicate republicans have carried the house of representatives by a safe working majority.

Connecticut gives 30,000 to 40,000 majority for the republican ticket.

New Hampshire gives a reduced republican vote and so does Rhode Island.

The republicans carried Pennsylvania by a plurality of 165,000, electing Judge Pennypacker governor. Pattison, the democratic candidate, carried only one ward in Philadelphia. Pittsburg gave Pennypacker nearly 30,000 plurality and Philadelphia's plurality was probably 100,000.

The republicans won overwhelmingly in Ohio, carrying the state by more than 100,000 plurality, a gain over 1900 of nearly 40,000. Cincinnati alone gave the unprecedented plurality of 30,000 for the republican state ticket. Tom Johnson's campaign methods were a failure.

Indiana gave a republican plurality of about 25,000. The congressional delegation remains unchanged politically.

West Virginia retains a solid republican congressional delegation.

Throughout the south generally was little interest in the election. In several states there was no opposition to the democrats. In North Carolina the republicans will lose a United States senator.

The count in Colorado is delayed by the vote on constitutional amendments, but the indications are that the democrats have won.

Wyomn returns show a sweeping republican victory.

The returns from Nebraska indicate that the election will be close. The democrats claim victory for William H. Thompson, their candidate for governor.

Missouri keeps up its democratic record on minor state officials, but one republican congressman is returned.

Utah reports a republican victory by increased majorities.

South Dakota elects a republican governor and legislature.

A quiet election in Washington state resulted in larger republican majorities on congressional candidates.

North Dakota's latest returns indicate the election of the republican state ticket, headed by Governor White, and the success of the republican candidates for congress.

In Iowa the republicans have probably elected all their candidates for congress. Former Gov. Boies, the democratic candidate in the district where Speaker Henderson declined to run, is beaten.

### ABSAROKEE HEAP TALK.

Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone Service Is Established.

The citizens of Absarokee were yesterday placed in communication with the outside world and had the privilege of talking over the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone line, which was completed to that thriving burg that day. Absarokee enjoys more privileges than Red Lodge now, as she can converse over the long distance telephone line to any principal city either in this state or in Utah, Idaho or Pacific coast states.

If Red Lodge had had this service she would not have had to remain in ignorance of the result of the election, both in Montana and other states, until three or four days had passed, and the correspondents of the daily press of the state could have sent their specials concerning the result of the election in Carbon county at any hour of the night, instead of having to depend on the Northern Pacific telegraph office, which only employs a day operator.
