CONVICTED OF MURDER.

Big Horn County Jury Says Tom Horn Killed Nickell Boy.

Last week at Basin City, Wyo., Tom Horn was convicted of the murder of Willie Nickell. This is a case that has attracted considerable attention in this vicinity, and we give a brief summary of the evidence as printed in the Big Horn News:

Tom Horn was employed as a cattle detective by the Iron Mountain Ranch company, of which J. C. Coble is one of the owners and manager, to protect the company from depredations, cattle rustling and to see that none trespassed upon the deeded land of the company.

Kels P. Nickell was the only man in the Iron Mountain country who had sheep, and it was the purpose of Tom Horn's visit to that section to watch these sheep and see that they did not go on land owned by the company for which Horn worked.

The state established by reputable witnesses that Tom Horn was within two miles of the scene of the homicide just twelve hours before it occurred, that he was then armed with a 30-30 Winchester rifle, and four hours after the killing the next morning rode into Laramie on a powerful horse which showed the effects of a long, hard ride. At this time Horn had a bundle of clothes strapped on the back of his saddle.

A few days later a man resembling Horn left a bundle of clothes in a shoe store at Laramie, which, upon being opened later, was found to contain a sweater showing blood stains and covered with dust and fiber-like substance resembling grass roots. This sweater was afterwards shown to Tom Horn in the county jail in this city and the sweater claimed as his property.

A few months later during the Festival of Mountain and Plain in Denver, Horn was drinking in a saloon with three well known Denver people, and at that time made incriminating statements, which in substance meant that he was guilty of the murder of Willie Nickell.

On January 10, 1902, Tom Horn, in a conversation with Deputy Marshal Joe Lefors, in the marshal's office in Meeteetse, made a confession, giving every detail of the killing of the boy, explaining how the crime was accomplished, its cause, and how much he was paid for it. This confession was overheard by Deputy Sheriff Leslie Snow and Court Stenographer Charles Ohnhaus, the latter taking it down in shorthand.

One of the strongest features of this confession is that it tallies in every detail with the circumstances surrounding the matter.

Carbon County Stock Shipments.

The cattle shipments from this point on Wednesday amounted to twenty-eight carloads, all of which were routed through to Chicago. The shippers were William Woods, David Smethurst, Mrs. Fred Draper, R. O. Morris, A. B. Ellis, B. E. Vaill, H. Bain, I. N. Dailey, Jeff Dinsdale, T. E. Denel, Alex. Vaughn, Mr. Hotchkiss and Mr. Doolan. The following day nine carloads were shipped to Chicago by J. A. Virtue and Frank Kelly; also two cars by William Greenough.

Chris Carston Sells His Cattle.

Chris Carston of Absarokee this week disposed of 110 head of cattle to E. S. Ellington of Big Timber and Herman Witt of Columbus. Mr. Ellington buying the steers and Mr. Witt the cows. The price is private, but it is understood that Mr. Carston realized fully as good a figure as he would by shipping the cattle to market.

Babcock Buys Bluewater Ranch.

George H. Babcock of Gebo recently purchased the ranch property of F. M. Billingsley, located on Bluewater and adjoining the homestead of Mr. Babcock. These gentlemen were in the

city Tuesday of last week at which time the deal was consummated. The consideration is said to have been \$6,000. By this purchase Mr. Babcock becomes the owner of one of the finest ranch properties in Carbon county.

Billings Horse Sale.

The Clark horse sale at Billings ended last Saturday and was the biggest thing of the kind ever conducted in the state. A total of 1444 horses were sold and in the aggregate brought over \$20,000.

Chapman Rounds Up Cattle.

John W. Chapman returned on Wednesday from the Rosebud country, where he has a bunch of cattle, which he has had rounded up and will have taken over to Wyoming for winter range.

Anderson and Hudson Ship.

O. O. Anderson and John Hudson of the Fishtail last week made a shipment of beef cattle, via Columbus to the Chicago market.

TO REDUCE EXPENSE.

New Slope Being Opened by Bridger Coal Company.

Free Press: The people of Bridger are greatly elated over the turn of affairs which have taken place the past week regarding the mine. Manager Hough has been instructed to sink another slope just behind the tipple, an improvement which has long been contemplated and when in operation will be of great benefit to the company, in that it reduces the haulage distance very materially and thus reduces the expense of hauling the coal before it reaches the railroad cars, which has always been a great drawback. It will also enable the company to handle more cars with the same number of miners, as a pit car will be able to make three trips where it makes one, and will concentrate the work instead of having it scattered as at present. This work will be started next week and pushed as rapidly as possible, and if everything turns out as well as anticipated it will not be long before the company will be shipping coal from the new entry.

The Press has been informed from a thoroughly reliable source that the mine is in better condition than at any time in its history, which state is due and credited to the efficient management and untiring energy of its present manager, Mr. George G. Hough.

The coal is of better quality than heretofore and the company is unable to supply the demand. The miners are working full time and we have the assurance that they will continue to do so all winter. Twenty or twenty-five more miners could be used at once.
