THEY MUST PAY TUITION

School Board Will Enforce Rule in Regard to Non-Residents Paying Tuition.

PROSECUTIONS TO BEGIN

Final Notice to Parents of Truant Children Before Beginning Action Against Them.

There are in the neighborhood of fifty or sixty pupils who are attending the city schools of this district whose parents reside in some other district and who pay no taxes for the support of the city schools. It is not fair nor just that such parties should be allowed to take advantage of the excellent school facilities afforded by the city unless they contribute their share toward the support of the schools. While it is true that they pay school taxes in other districts, not one cent of this can be collected by this district, but is used by the district where in it is collected.

This matter was thoroughly talked over at the meeting of the school board Monday night and it was determined to live up to the letter of the rule adopted by the board of charging a tuition fee for all non-resident pupils. No deviation will be made in any case, and in order to take advantage of the educational facilities of the city, non-residents of the district must first pay their quota for the support of the schools.

In relation to those children between the ages of eight and fourteen years who do not attend school, the school board will take one more step before prosecuting the parents or guardians for not observing the law by sending the children to school. The truant officer will notify personally such parties that their children are not attending school, and if the children do not make their appearance at school after such notice prosecutions will follow.

The monthly report of the principal showed that the enrollment for last month was the largest in the history of the schools, being 461. The average daily attendance was slightly in excess of 96 percent.

Miss Agnes B. Ross, recently elected county superintendent of schools, had conveyed the impression to the principal that her resignation as teacher in the first primary department would be presented about Christmas time, and hence the board instructed the principal to open up correspondence with a view of securing a teacher to fill the prospective vacancy.

THROWN FROM HIS HORSE.

Sydney Fox Victim of Mishap While Going Hunting.

While the hunting party that left here Monday afternoon for Lewis' ranch were on their way out there, and had gone as far as Carter's ranch on Little Rocky, the horse which Sydney Fox was riding suddenly stumbled and the rider was thrown from the saddle, striking the ground in such a manner as to lacerate the side of his face and produce some minor scalp wounds. His companions found him in a semi-conscious condition, conveyed him to the nearest house and sent a telephone message to Red Lodge, whereupon Frank Fox and Dr. Butler secured a rig and hurried to the scene.

Syd was brought back to town the day following the accident. While his injuries are painful they are not at all serious, and he expects to be around again as usual in the course of a few days.

TO THE HIGHEST BIDDER.

Several Tracts of State Lands in Carbon County Secured at Auction.

The second sale and lease of state lands in Carbon county was conducted at the court house in this city last Tuesday by John P. Schmit, assistant register of the state land office at Helena.

J. A. Newton of Joliet purchased 160 acres in the vicinity of his home, paying \$10 an acre for the land. It is described as being the southeast quarter of section 16, township 4 south, range 23 east.

Edward Larkin bought 120 acres near Bridger at the minimum price at which these lands are allowed to be sold for, \$10 an acre. His purchase includes the west half of the northeast quarter and the southeast quarter

of northeast quarter of section 16, township 6 south, range 23 east.

David Baker secured ownership of about 118 acres near Silesia at \$10 an acre. The description of his piece of land is lots 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 and the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 36, township 3 south, range 23 east.

John R. Weaver leased for a term of five years a section of land a mile or two beyond the city cemetery at an annual rental of \$80. It is section 16, township 7 south, range 20 east.

Robert Beattie leased a section four miles north of Rockvale, paying an annual rental of \$40 for five years. It lies in township 3 south, range 23 east, being section 16.

NEARLY DRAGGED TO DEATH.

Roberts Rancher Victim of Serious Runaway Accident.

What came near being a fatal runaway accident occurred at Roberts last Friday night. John Nisera, a rancher, had just driven home with a load of coal and after unloading the same started to drive to the stable, when his team became frightened and ran away. In his attempt to put the brake on, Mr. Nisera was thrown from the wagon, his foot becoming entangled in the brake, and he was dragged head downward for a distance of fifty yards before he could release himself from his perilous position. He was badly bruised about the head and his left ear was nearly torn off, only hanging by the merest shred. How he managed to reach home he himself cannot tell. He was at once brought to town and secured the services of Dr. Lutz, who took fifteen stitches in sewing the wounded lobe in place and has hopes that it may grow on again, although the success of the operation is somewhat doubtful at present. The victim of the accident is staying in town until he recovers sufficiently to return home.

IN JAIL FOR CONTEMPT.

Murderer Cuckoo's Witness Finally Located and Arrested.

L. M. Miles, witness for the defense in the "Cuckoo" murder trial, who failed to present himself in response to the subpoena served upon him by the sheriff, will have to face Judge Henry on a charge of contempt of court. At the time of the trial Miles was a resident of Bridger, but instead of coming to Red Lodge with the other witnesses he left the county and his whereabouts were not ascertained until recently, when he was located at Aldridge, in Park county. He was arrested there the first of the week by Sheriff Reley of Livingston and taken to Billings and turned over to Sheriff Potter, who brought the prisoner up today and lodged him in the county jail. The arrest of Miles was at the instance of Judge Frank Henry, who, at the coming term of the district court, will give the accused a chance to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt.

WATER RIGHT SUIT TO COME UP.

Judge Henry Will Be Here Next Monday to Open District Court.

From present indications the criminal business brought before the next term of the district court will be very light and it is doubtful if it will warrant the summoning of petit jurors for the term. The most important case is that of David Sanborn for perjury and it is improbable that Judge Henry will order a jury drawn for trial of this case alone.

The Rock Creek water right suit will come on for trial at this term, very likely, and will be tried without a jury. As there are over 200 parties to this suit, it will consume the greater part of the term, which is expected to last until Christmas, and will be taken under advisement by the court and his findings in the case will not be handed down for several months to come.

Judge Frank Henry is expected to arrive from Livingston next Monday and will hear the election contests before taking up other court business.

DEMANDS A RECOUNT

Tie Vote for County Attorney Results in the Institution of Contest Proceedings.

RENO IS STILL RUNNING

Alleges False Returns from Reno and East Red Lodge—Hearing by Judge Henry Monday.

The official canvass of the election returns of Carbon county having verified the tie vote for county attorney as between F. C. Woodward, republican, and L. B. Reno, democrat, each receiving 640 votes to 278 cast for J. H. Ruberson, fusionist, a contest has been instituted in the district court by Mr. Reno, who has employed Attorneys Fox & Fox to bring the proceedings.

Preliminary to the institution of the contest Mr. Reno last Monday made a written demand upon County Clerk Jesse L. Smith for the issuance to him, the relator, of a certificate of election as county attorney. As the official returns showed that there had been no election to this office the demand for the certificate was of course not granted, whereupon Mr. Reno immediately inaugurated contest proceedings in the district court, praying Judge Henry to issue a writ or order directing the county clerk to present to the court the ballots returned from the precincts of Reno and East Red Lodge.

The complaint and the prayer were sent to Judge Henry at Livingston, who, last Tuesday, signed an order commanding the county clerk to present the Reno and East Red Lodge ballots in court in Red Lodge next Monday, Nov. 17, or appear and show cause for not doing so.

The action is instituted in the name of the state against the county clerk. In the complaint, Mr. Reno, as relator, alleges false returns from the two precincts of Reno and East Red Lodge, claiming that the Reno election judges threw out three ballots cast for the relator and that the East Red Lodge election judges counted five ballots for Ruberson, the fusion candidate, that were plainly marked for the democratic nominee.

RIP HAD A FIT.

Thomas Jefferson Declines to Sleep Twenty Years in Red Lodge.

The theater-goers of the city suffered a great disappointment last Wednesday through the arbitrary action of Thomas Jefferson, the famous actor, in cancelling at the eleventh hour his Red Lodge engagement, wherein this excellent troupe was to present "Rip Van Winkle."

Several things conspired to place Mr. Jefferson in a bad frame of mind. First, the train was late in reaching Red Lodge; second, the Spofford hotel was all torn up with improvements so as to be unable to accommodate the company, and third, the opera house and stage were not up to the gentleman's expectations. As a result Mr. Jefferson, in a moment of ill humor, declared that he would not risk his reputation by playing in a barn, whereupon he cancelled the date and he and his troupe boarded the same train which brought them up from Billings and returned to the main line in high noon, thus disappointing an audience that would have packed the magnificent opera house from pit to gallery—parquet, boxes, dress circle and all.

The advance sale of seats had reached nearly \$150 and it is pretty certain that Mr. Jefferson, if he had appeared here, would have awakened from his twenty year sleep in the presence of a \$300 house.
