The supreme court decided this week that the city of Helena could not, after having exceeded the limit of indebtedness, pay or contract to pay out any moneys other than for the actual and necessary expenses of conducting the city affairs, and a temporary injunction to that effect was issued. There are hundreds of property owners in the city who are hopeful that the injunction will be made permanent. Suits are now pending for nearly \$150,000 in which the city is defendant. These include actions brought to enforce the payment of city warrants and for the payment of between \$70,000 and \$80,000 claimed by the water company in accordance with a contract entered into by the city council under a former administration, but which the present administration has been trying to repudiate.

Governor Toole left today for a ten days' visit to the east, and expects to visit the livestock exposition in Chicago during his absence. It is a notable fact that he does not summon Lieutenant-Governor Higgins here when he leaves the capital. The latter named official may get some glory out of the office, but that is about all he has gotten so far.

Rumors of newspaper changes here are rife. Men who profess to know say that the morning and evening republican dailies are to be consolidated, and that the change will soon go into effect. It is well known that no one of the Helena dailies is a paying publication, and it is also a fact that the newspaper field is greatly overdone.

It might be well to sound a note of warning to your delegation to the forthcoming session of the legislature, and advise them to come prepared to meet the usual number of persons who want to serve the state at so much per during the sixty day session of the legislative assembly. Applicants by the score have already loomed up, and the beginning is not yet in sight.

Luck in Thirteen.
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Helena, Nov. 11.—Judge Knowles called the calendar of the United States district court today. The most important criminal case on the docket is that against M. L. Bridgeman, former agent of the Belknap Indians, who is charged with having made false claims to the government. His case will be called on the 13th. There is also the usual quota of cases against the Indians, who, although wards and beneficiaries of the government, are a source of great expense to the nation at every session of the United States court.

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A BRIDGER BURGLARY

Cowpuncher Breaks Into Gebo's Saloon and Walks Off With the Cash Register.

ARRESTED AT FROMBERG

Culprit Confesses His Guilt and is Bound Over to the District Court.

The saloon of Henry Gebo at Bridger was burglarized last Sunday night by Henry Gaspool, a cowpuncher, and the culprit is now languishing in the county jail in this city awaiting trial on the charge of burglary in the night time.

After effecting an entrance into the saloon Gaspool set them up to himself several times and appropriated four quart bottles of whiskey and the cash register. He begged the register off several hundred yards, broke it open and decamped with the contents, between \$30 and \$40. Then he proceeded to Fromberg and cached the whiskey and the money in a barn.

Under Sheriff Gebo was informed of the robbery and on Monday proceeded to Fromberg, where he arrested Gaspool in an intoxicated condition. On being taken into custody, the drunken fellow confessed his guilt and some of the cached whiskey and money was recovered. Gaspool was then taken before Justice Stone at Bridger and informed the court that he desired to plead guilty. He was bound over to the district court in bonds of \$500, in default of which he was brought to Red Lodge and lodged in jail.

Fielding and "Tom Jones."

Notwithstanding the good prices he received for his books, Fielding was always more or less in difficulties from his reckless mode of living. "Tom Jones," however, was nearly being sacrificed in one of his impetuous fits for the sum of \$25. The publisher fortunately asked for a day to consider if he could risk such a sum, and Fielding in the meantime met Thomson, the poet, to whom he told the transaction. Thomson scorned the idea of Fielding parting with his brains for such a sum and offered to get him better terms, but Fielding felt himself partly pledged. Never did author wait more anxiously on a publisher hoping to be accepted than did Fielding hoping to be refused. He was refused!

Joyfully he carried his manuscript to Thomson to fulfill his promise. The poet introduced Fielding to Andrew Miller, who handed the book over to his wife to read. She discerned its merits and advised her husband to keep it. Over a pleasant dinner given by Miller to Fielding and Thomson the bargain was made which secured Fielding, to his great delight, \$200 for the story. Miller is said to have cleared \$18,000 by "Tom Jones," out of which he paid Fielding from time to time various sums to the amount of \$2,000, bequeathing him also a handsome legacy.

The Structure of Ferns.

When flowering plants usually make seed, that is generally the last effort for plant life. The seed is the beginning of the life of the new plant. Ferns, however, only produce spores for reproductive purposes. These spores germinate and go through the same process subsequently that flowers go through in the production of seeds. The spores expand when the germinating time comes and form a flat, green membrane. What are then really the flowers appear on this membrane. As a general rule after these fern flowers have matured the membrane dries up and disappears. In one family of ferns, however, natives of New Holland, named platynerium, this green blade is permanent and continues to enlarge, becoming really a portion of the plant. Every year a new blade is formed which spreads over the old ones. The large plant is of a totally different character, having the fronds of ordinary ferns.
