SOME SAMPLES OF THEIR WORK

No. 1: The League Mill Bill.

HOUSE BILL NO. 358



Representative Arnold of Valley who Introduced Mill Bill.

A Bill for an Act Entitled: "An Act Authorizing the State of Montana to Become Indebted in the Sum of Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars in Excess of the Constitutional Limit and Over and Above Any Bonded Indebtedness Heretofore Incurred and for Which It is Now Obligated, or Which Has Heretofore Been Authorized; Providing for the Issuance and Sale of Bonds in the Name of the State to Acquire Funds for the Purchasing or Building of a State Owned Flour Mill or Mill for the Grinding or Manufacture of All Kinds of Grain Into Food and Feed Products, in Connection With a State Owned Grain Elevator at Great Falls, Montana, Both Elevator and Mill to Be Owned, Controlled and Operated by the State of Montana and Used for Purchase and Storage, Manufacture and Marketing of Grain and Grain Products, Prescribing the Form of Such Bonds; Providing for the Levying of a Tax to Pay the Principal Thereof and the Interest Accruing Thereon; Providing for the Submission of the Question of the Issuance of Such Bonds and Prescribing the Form of the Ballots to Be Used and the Duties of the State Board of Examiners Relative to the Issuance of Such Bonds and the Duties of the Secretary of State Relative to the Submission of Said Question to the Qualified Electors."

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana:

Section 1. That the State Board of Examiners of the State of Montana is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to issue bonds in the name of the State of Montana, to an amount not exceeding the sum of five hundred thousand (\$500,000) dollars in excess of constitutional limitation of indebtedness and over and above any bonded indebtedness heretofore incurred or authorized or for which the state is now obligated; that the money to be derived from the sale of said bonds, or so much thereof as may be required, shall be used for the purchasing or building of a Flour Mill or Mill for the grinding and manufacture of all kinds of grain into food or feed products in connection with a Terminal Grain Elevator with the necessary equipment at Great Falls, Montana, both Terminal Elevator and "State owned Flour Mills" to be owned, controlled and operated by the State of Montana, and used for the storage and marketing of grain and for the purchases of grain to be manufactured in said mill, and the expense of manufacturing and marketing the products of such grain, and the said money so acquired shall be deposited in the State Treasury of Montana and paid out as provided by law for said purpose and for no other purpose.

Section 2. That the bonds provided for in this Act shall be issued in denomination of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars each and shall become due in ten (10) years from the date of issuance and be redeemable and payable at the option of the state at any time after five (5) years from the date thereof at any interest paying period and shall bear interest at the rate of not exceeding five per cent (5 per cent) per annum payable semi-annually on the fifteenth of June and December of each year at the office of the State Treasurer of the State of Montana and shall bear date as of the day of the issuance thereof.

Section 3. That such bonds issued under the provisions of this Act shall contain a condition substantially as follows:

"This bond is one of a series of state bonds of the denomination of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars each of like tenor and date and numbered from one (1) to (.....), inclusive, and aggregating the sum of dollars. The right is hereby reserved to redeem this bond at any regular interest paying period as state herein by payment of the principal and interest in full to the date of redemption; provided, that not less than ten (10) days' notice shall be given by the State Treasurer in writing or by publication of such intention on the part of the state to make redemption."

Section 4. That the State Board of Examiners shall make provision for the sale of all food and feed products manufactured in such mill at a price that after paying the full purchase price of the grain and all expenses of manufacture and marketing shall not be greater than the cost of such grain manufacture and marketing, and that such sales shall be direct to either consumers or retail or wholesale dealers, and any surplus accumulating and not necessary to conduct the business of the said mill shall be paid into the State Treasury and credited to a separate fund designated as the State Flour Mill Fund, and said fund shall be used exclusively for the payment of the interest and redemption of such Flour Mill Bonds herein provided for. If the money so paid into the State Flour Mill Fund is not sufficient to pay the semi-annual interest on the bonds, and the redemption thereof, then and in that event there shall be levied annually not exceeding one-half of a mill on the dollar on all lands agricultural in character, which said tax, when collected by the County Treasurer shall be accounted for and paid over to the State Treasurer to be by the State Treasurer held in the State Flour Mill Fund, which shall be used exclusively for the payment of the interest on such bonds and for the redemption thereof.

Section 5. That the county assessors of the counties in Montana, commencing with the year wherein the bonds herein provided for may be issued and continuing so long as such bonds or any part thereof or any interest thereon may remain unpaid shall designate upon the assessment rolls the lands subject to the tax in the foregoing section, provided for.

Section 6. That the bonds herein referred to shall be in such form as may be prescribed by the attorney general and approved by said board and issued under the great seal of the State of Montana and shall be registered in the office of the State Treasurer. Said bonds shall have interest coupons attached covering the interest due semi-annually and shall have the lithographed facsimile signature of the members of the State Board of Examiners affixed thereto.

Section 7. That the bonds herein authorized and provided for shall be disposed of by the State Board of Examiners in such manner and upon such notice as seems for the best interests of the State in carrying out the terms and provisions of this Act and none of said bonds shall be sold for less than the face value thereof.

SHERIDAN CNT'Y CLEAN AT LAST

O'Grady Seated

Mrs. Beatrice K. O'Grady, farmers' candidate for county auditor against James F. Redmond, the Loyalty League candidate, who was counted out apparently deliberately by the county canvassing board, which canvassing board was composed of the now famous "Three Blind Men," was declared elected by Judge T. A. Thompson of Kalispell, sitting in place of Judge John Hurly of Glasgow, who disqualified himself, tonight, by a majority of 62, called Thursday morning at 10 o'clock and continuing day and evening until tonight, Friday, at 10 o'clock.

This contest ends, probably, one of the bitterest and most sensational election campaigns ever waged in Sheridan county and the northeastern portion of the state of Montana.

The gang that has dominated the politics and government of Sheridan county ever since the county was created and which was inherited from old Valley county from which Sheridan county was divided, and the history of which domination reads like several pages from the history of the rule of Boss Tweed of Tammany Hall in New York in the palmy days of that organization, got its fatal wound, with the defeat of James F. Redmond, for whom they have exerted every means of maintaining in office and his final removal from office means the passing of the gang that has looted and practically bankrupted the county.

In the campaign last fall every possible means, decent or indecent, brave or cowardly, low and contemptible, was utilized to save Redmond from man ignominious repudiation at the hands of the electors and even the sacredness and purity of the bal-

lot was not a guarantee against the designs of these intriguers.

Mrs. O'Grady made a clean and honorable campaign and was known from the beginning to have been elected and deliberately counted out. The farmers made up their mind that this scandalous election steal should not stand, and money was subscribed from all over the county to hire the best talent available and fight the matter through to a finish and B. K. Wheeler, who was removed from the office of United States District Attorney at the behest of the "Kopper Kompany" and the Montana Loyalty League, whose activities are directed by the fanatical editor of the Helena Independent, the Honorable Will Campbell, was secured, and a contest instituted, which was tried before Judge T. A. Thompson, who tried the case in a masterly and impartial manner at all times, and indicated that at least there is one judge in the state, that is both fair, impartial, and above cheap political bias; who believes that laws are made for farmers and producers as well as the "Kopper Krowd" and political cooties.

It is reported that the contest money for Mrs. O'Grady's opponent was furnished by the so-called "Montana Loyalty League," and that they came through with \$250 to help fasten upon Sheridan county, a man declared elected by at least very questionable methods. However, this is no surprise to those who are acquainted with the above "black flag" profiteers' organization, who disgrace the word "loyalty," and bring reproach upon "old glory" by the use of the word and the flag in furthering the interest of the "thirstiest band of political pirates that ever tried to scuttle the ship of democracy or reduce mankind to a condition of slavery.

The case instituted against Adolph A. Major, elected clerk and recorder by the farmers by Mrs. Ben Johnson, was dismissed by the court upon a failure to make a showing after the lead of Mr. Major was increased from a majority of twenty odd to sixty-two, and a judgment was entered against her bondsmen for the costs and a reasonable attorney's fee of \$250, which will probably be "couched up" immediately.
