ASPECT OF WAR.

An American officer, Cutting, is in jail at Paso del Norte, Mexico. The State Department at Washington has made a demand on the Mexican government for his release. The Mexican Judge did not recognize the authority of the Mexican government, and refused to release Cutting or put him on bond. The American was transferred to the District Court of the State, Chihuahua, and the authorities refused to set a day for his trial. In the meantime, the Mexican government is massing troops at Paso del Norte. The American troops at San Antonio, Texas, have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to march at a moment's notice.

This looks like war, and it may be, that the boys in blue will have another chance to sing Yankee Doodle and Dixie in the halls of the Montezumas.

We believe the time is rapidly approaching when the United States will be compelled, in self-defense, to annex both Mexico and Canada.

The sooner Mexico is governed by a stable government, the better it will be for her citizens; that kind of government the distracted country will never have, except as sovereign state of this Union.

Mexico once before felt the strength of American blows, and she may feel it again, before she is ready to realize that American citizens are not to be deprived of liberty without cause.

HOW THEY LOVE THE SOLDIER.

Senator Blair, of New Hampshire, the most blatant critic of the President's pension vetoes, was held up in the Senate the other day in his true light. The Senator was becoming obnoxious, on account of his unceasing war on the President.

Senator Kenna unearthed some of the New Hampshire Senator's transactions with the widows of Union soldiers; in one case it was found that the great Republican soldier-lover, charged a soldier's widow \$80.90 as a fee for getting her pension allowed. It further appeared that she was owing him \$200, and in his great love had a writ of attachment issued against her little property. Settling a Grudge.

We learn that at a barbecue near Jack Parmer's at Clifty bridge, Warren county, Ky., last Saturday, that a young man by the name of Uge Taylor struck one Dock Sublett, a middle aged man, in the head with a stick, knocking him senseless, and which he struck him on the arm and in the side. About two years ago in a fuss at Hadly, Ky., between Taylor and John Ranner, this man Sublett being a relative to Ranner, took his part and knocked Taylor in the head with a hammer almost killing him. However, he recovered and says he got even with Sublett last Saturday. Sublett, when last heard from, was in a critical condition, but his recovery was thought to be possible.

Kentucky's Fine Turpines.

In conversation with Gen. Edmonds, who has traveled over most of Kentucky, whose good roads are now tantamount throughout the Union, we heard some interesting facts of how the improvements came to be general all over the State. The first man that inaugurated the road improvement there, was that famous old Presbyterian, Dr. Holt, J. Breckinridge. He commenced by going to see his neighbors along a line of road. His plan was to ask each farmer: "How much is your land worth?" When told he would say: "Well, how much do you think a macadamized road would increase the value of it?" Being told \$10 or \$15 an acre, he would close in by saying: "Well, suppose you subscribe to a company we are forming to build a road to the amount of \$5 an acre of your farm?" In this way private companies were formed. The roads cost \$2,000 a mile, of which the county court of each county, after it was satisfied that the private company was composed of responsible citizens, subscribed on behalf of the county to the stock to the amount of \$1,000 a mile. The roads were built, toll-gates put on them, and the stock paid the county and the stockholders a dividend. In this way Kentucky has become gridironed with metalled pikes.

Now look at the result of this; taking four counties in Kentucky, all rather small ones, Montgomery has 99 miles of metalled pike, Clarke, the adjoining county, has 150 miles; Fayette, which joins that, has 250 miles; and Bourbon, the next county to it, has 300 miles—nearly 800 miles of macadam-

ized road in four small counties. What has been the result in increasing values? Remember they are all small counties. The real estate in Montgomery is assessed at \$4,000,000, Clarke \$6,000,000, Fayette \$8,000,000, and Bourbon \$8,000,000. An increase of value which is the direct result of road building.
