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State on more favorable conditions than are prescribed by law similar corporations organized under the laws of this State.

Section 1. No corporation in existence at the time of the adoption of this Constitution shall have the benefit of future legislation without first filing in the office of the Secretary of State an acceptance of the provisions of this Constitution in binding form.

Section 2. All existing charters, or grants of special or exclusive privileges, under which a bona fide organization shall not have taken place, and business been commenced in good faith, at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall hereafter be void and of no effect.

Section 3. No corporation shall engage in business other than that expressly authorized in its charter or the law under which it may have been or hereafter be organized, nor shall it hold any real estate, except such as may be proper and necessary for carrying on its legitimate business, for a longer period than five years, under penalty of an escheat to the State.

Section 4. No corporation shall issue stock or bonds except for an equivalent in money paid, or labor done, or property actually received and applied to the purposes for which such corporation was created, and neither labor nor property shall be received in payment for stock or bonds at a greater value than the market price at the time said labor was done or property delivered, and all fictitious increase of stock or indebtedness shall be void.

Section 5. Corporations formed under the laws of this State shall, at all times, have one or more known places of business in this State, and an authorized agent, or agents, thereon whom process may be executed, and the General Assembly shall enact laws to carry into effect the provisions of this section.

Section 6. The State, in the exercise of the right of eminent domain, shall have and retain the same powers to take the property and franchises of incorporated companies, for public use, as it has and retains to take the property of individuals, and the exercise of the police powers of this State shall never be abridged, or so construed as to permit corporations to conduct their business in such manner as to infringe the equal rights of individuals.

Section 7. Transportation of freight and passengers by railroad, steamboat or other common carrier, shall be so regulated by general law as to prevent unjust discrimination, and no common carrier shall be permitted to contract for relief from its common law liability.

Section 8. No railroad, steamboat, or other common carrier, under heavy penalty, shall be fixed by the General Assembly, or shall at reduced rates not common to the public sell tickets for transportation to any State, district, city, town or county officer, member of General Assembly or judge, and any State, district, city, town or county officer, member of the General Assembly, or judge, who shall accept or use a free pass or passes, or shall receive or use tickets or transportation at reduced rates not common to the public shall forfeit his office. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to enact laws to enforce the provisions of this section.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly from time to time, as the necessities may require, to pass such laws as will be necessary to prevent all trusts, pools, combinations, or other corporations, from combining to depreciate below its real value any article above its real value.

Section 10. Any association or corporation, or the lessees or managers thereof, organized for the purpose, or any individual, shall have the right to construct and maintain lines of telegraph within this State, and to connect the same with other lines, and said companies shall receive and transmit each other's messages without unreasonable delay or discrimination, and all of such companies are hereby declared to be common carriers and subject to legislative control. Public telephone companies, operating exchanges in different towns, or cities, or other public stations, shall receive and transmit each other's messages without unreasonable delay or discrimination. The General Assembly, by general laws of uniform operation, provide reasonable regulations, to give full effect to this section.

Section 11. If any railroad, telegraph, express or other corporation organized under the laws of this State shall consolidate, by sale or otherwise, with any railroad, telegraph, express, or other corporation organized under the laws of any other State, the same shall not thereby become a foreign corporation, but the courts of this State shall retain jurisdiction over that part of the corporate property within the limits of this State in all matters which had not taken place.

Section 12. No railroad, telegraph, telephone or common carrier company shall consolidate its capital stock, franchises or property, or pool its earnings, in whole or in part, with any other railroad, telegraph, telephone or common carrier company owning a parallel or competing line, or acquire by purchase, lease or otherwise any parallel or competing line, or operate the same; nor shall any railroad company or other common carrier combine or make any contract with the owners of any vessel that leaves, or makes port in this State, or with any common carrier, by which combination or contract the earnings of one doing the carrying are to be shared by the other not doing the carrying.

Section 13. No corporation organized outside the limits of this State shall be allowed to transact business within the

then for the purpose of locating a line of road between Henderson and Bowling Green. Engineer A. B. Fitch, of Terre Haute, made his report of the survey just completed by him, and the line as reported as adopted.
