Seven-Dollar Cattle. Mr. H. E. Rockwood, of Illinois, who recently sold a car load of cattle on the Chicago market for \$7 per hundred, as mentioned two weeks ago, writes to the Breeders' Gazette the following particulars about the feeding, etc., of those cattle:

"The cattle sold by me recently in Chicago at seven cents per pound were heavy steers out of a bunch of ninety head, which I bought in Chicago on the 23rd of last February. They were grade Shorthorns, two and three years old, and showed some corn feeding. They were put onto corn first and when on full feed, worked gradually to shelled corn, giving them all they wanted till shipped. For roughness they were given clover hay until May 1 and after that timothy. They were turned on grass May 25 and given a little hay all summer. The last eight weeks about two pounds of oil-meal per head was mixed in the shelled corn each day."

"These fourteen cattle were not weighed separately from the others, but as near as I can judge weighed 1,150 lbs. when I got them. The ninety head averaged 1,025 lbs., and as they averaged 1,648 lbs. when sold, they made about 500 lbs. gain per head. They made me plenty of money."


