

INTERESTING SIGHTS

Viewed by Miner Delegates in and Around Cincinnati, During Recent Convention.

Echols, Ky., March 24, 1910.
 Editors Herald:—Having been in Cincinnati since the evening of the 14th inst., going as a delegate to the special International Convention of the United Mine Workers of America, and the convention having but very little work as yet to do, as the Joint Scale Committee has been in session and the general convention has adjourned from time to time awaiting the report of the Scale Committee, in order to pass off the time I have been taking in some of the sights in and around Cincinnati.

I went to Ft. Thomas, seven miles out of the city, over in Kentucky. We did not have much time to spend out there, but we saw the barracks and quarters. They have nice buildings, grounds, driveways and walks. We saw two old style cannons dismounted, on display as relics of the old war days. We were on the grounds at roll-call and witnessed their maneuvers which showed great training. This was a beautiful and impressive sight.

I also walked over the great Suspension Bridge crossing the Ohio from Cincinnati to Covington, Ky. I had read of the bridge and thought I knew how it looked, but when I saw it it did not look as history had described it. There has been an additional cable added and it also has iron truss work all through to strengthen it and steady it, so that now wagons, street cars, horses and people travel over it at any gait desired.

The members of the convention were invited out to see the City Work House, some seven miles out of the heart of the city. There were some 200 of us went out in the afternoon and went through the work house. They do not all break rock, as most people suppose. It is only a few of the shortest term fellows that break rock. The fellows that are sent for any length of time are put in the shops where they make brushes of all kinds and wire goods and various other articles, too numerous to mention.

Next we went into the home for dependent children. When we went in they were all assembled in a kind of entertainment hall. There were about 300, ranging in size from just big enough to walk, up to 14 years old. The professor of the institution seemed to appreciate our visit very much. He had the children render us several pieces of vocal music which was something remarkable for children of their age. Then they were cheered by the miners, after which the professor said: "Boys, let's have three cheers for the miners," and so they did. Then we witnessed the children leave the room, which was equal to a military company, so far as training was concerned. We were then shown through their dining room, bakery, kitchen and sleeping quarters, then to their work shop. We were informed by the professor that the boys did their own cooking, serving their own meals, making their own clothing and shoes. We were in the shoe factory and saw shoes in all stages of completion where the boys had left off when time came for something else. They have about six pairs of shoes each—three pairs for Sunday and three pairs for everyday wear. We went down to the drill grounds and watched a company of them go through an army drill. They were commanded by one of the boys, I suppose about 14 years old. I have seen State militia and United States regulars drill, but I don't think I ever saw a more perfect drill than this. Then the band, composed of thirty boys, came out, and rendered some as fine music as I ever heard. The part of this trip that was most interesting was to draw a contrast between those children as we see them now, and to picture them when they came here. Some of them were sent here for offenses committed, while the remainder were children who had no other place to call home.

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
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
