CALEB'S COIN CAME RAPIDLY

Say the Men Who Ought to Know.

POLITICAL SECRETS EXPOSED

Split Over Battle Between Edwards and Famous Ex-Prisoner.

Lexington, Ky., May 28.—The contest for the Republican Congressional nomination in the Eleventh District between Don C. Edwards, present Representative, and Caleb Powers, who was liberated by Governor Willson, after having spent eight years in prison, charged with complicity in the assassination of William Goebel, is waxing warm.

The mountain press is devoting many columns to the cause of their respective choices. The newspapers that are supporting Edwards publish statements in support of a claim that Powers left prison a rich man and that he resorted to deception in an affidavit to Governor Willson to the effect that he had no money with which to pay the expenses of a fifth trial. Much of interest to Kentuckians hitherto untold is coming to light through this campaign.

The Wayne County Outlook and Somerset Herald publish a letter from James H. Moore, of Mildred, Jackson County, who, during the greater portion of the time that Powers was in prison, traveled in nearly every State in the union, soliciting contributions for Powers' defense.

"I notice that Caleb Powers is pleading poverty to the people in his campaign for Congress," says Moore. "Having traveled in his behalf and being familiar with the circumstances under which enormous sums of money were raised for him, I am not surprised that he continues to deceive the public, but I am surprised at his calling attention to his affidavit filed with the Governor.

"In this affidavit he swears that he came out of prison \$5,000 in debt, with no money or property to pay it, yet, in 1905, and after the expense of his third trial had been paid, he had money out on interest.

"His case was pending in Federal Courts, and for two or three years a vigorous, persistent, business effort was made in most every State in the Union to collect money to meet expenses of the fourth and last trial.

"It may not be generally known that the committee at Louisville, besides paying the expenses of Caleb Powers' trial, gave him money also, and that no portion of the tens and hundreds of thousands of dollars contributed to him directly, or through his many collectors, ever went to the committee having charge of his defense fund.

"Indeed, his personal representatives and solicitors had instructions from him to send all money direct to him and not to the committee at Louisville, which had charge of his defense fund and raised the money and paid the expenses of his trials.

"We were instructed also by him to not send post-office money orders, as he did not want the people to know he was getting so much money, and he sent the checks and cash out of the State for deposit after his bank account became so large that he could not handle it at home.

"The sale of his books was no small thing. As early as 1903 he had orders for 40,000 or 50,000, and they sold well until the public learned that the speech printed was very different from the speech actually delivered by Powers. It became necessary to suppress the publication of lists of contributors of contributions for fear the public would get wise to the enormous sums already collected.

"It was necessary to keep the folks at home impressed with Caleb's poverty, as no county in the mountains ever failed to come across every time an excuse could be found to call upon them, and when his kinspeople went out to collect for him they had to be dressed up out of the funds contributed by the people for Caleb's defense."

FIVE PER CENT. RAISE

For Ohio County—State Board of Equalization Passes on All Counties.

The State Board of Equalization at a meeting held recently, passed upon the proposed raise of the assessable property in Ohio county. The raise was tentatively fixed at 15 per cent, and notice was given to Judge Wedding thereof. He, together with County Clerk W. S. Tinsley, former Assessor S. W. Laech and County Attorney C. E. Smith appeared before the board on the 12th day of April to protest against the raise and give evidence as to why the proposed 15 per cent raise should not be made. How well they succeeded is evidenced by the fact that two-thirds of the proposed increase was taken off and the final increase fixed at 5 per cent of the assessed value.

The county receiving the highest raise in this section of the state is McLean county, which received a raise of twenty per cent. The counties in this section receiving raises are: Daviess, 5 per cent; Hancock, 5 per cent; Christian, 5 per cent; Henderson, 15 per cent; Webster, 15 per cent; McLean, 20 per cent; Ohio, 5 per cent; Union, 5 per cent; and Hopkins, 15 per cent.

Twenty-six counties escape a raise, the local assessment and equalization being accepted in that number, and ninety-three counties were given a boost. The increases range from five per cent to twenty-five per cent on lands, personal property and town lots. Four counties got the big raise of twenty-five per cent. They were Ballard, Bar, Carlisle and Morgan; twenty-three counties got the minimum raise of five per cent.

The population centers of the State all got raises. Campbell county getting ten per cent; Jefferson county, twelve per cent; Kenton county, fifteen per cent; McCracken county, ten per cent.

Only Fayette county, of the big counties in the State, escaped a raise. The action by the board is final unless some action should be taken in the courts by a disgruntled county on the idea that the board raised instead of equalized the property values. The work of the board will be immediately certified to the State Auditor for tax collection.

CHAMP CLARK'S GREAT SPEECH

In Congress, Keynote of the Campaign.

ARRAIGNS THE REPUBLICANS

For Inflicting the Monstrous Tariff Measure Upon a Suffering Public.

Washington, May 26.—"The Payne-Aldrich tariff revision WAS upward!" "It was upward by approximately 1.71 per cent!"

"It has ALREADY resulted in increased prices."

Thus did Champ Clark, of Missouri, leader of the Democrats in the House of Representatives, thunder his reply to the speeches of President Taft and other Republican leaders who are attempting to feed a disgusted public on the assertion that the Payne-Aldrich bill was "the best tariff bill" ever passed.

Mr. Clark's speech had been carefully prepared. It was a complete and effective answer to the many bold misrepresentations that have been made by the Republicans, who are desperately in need of campaign material of any sort. Hundreds of thousands of copies of the minority leader's great speech will be mailed out by the Democrats. It is practically a handbook on the Payne-Aldrich bill.

To start with the Missourian denounced the proposed appropriation of \$250,000 of the people's money for the purpose of enabling the Republicans to gather data with which to attempt to prove that the new tariff law is a God-send to the country.

He condemned the joker in the tariff bill. He deplored a condition which permits the steel trust and other monopolies to sell their manufactured products cheaper to foreigners than to Americans.
