### MRS. JULIA WEDDING DIES AT HOME AT WHITESVILLE

Mrs. Julia Wedding, one of the most highly respected and best known women of Daviess county, died of paralysis 9:30 o'clock Friday night, at her home at Whitesville, after a critical illness, lasting for over two weeks. Mrs. Wedding formerly lived at Hartford, but two years ago moved to Whitesville. She was 58 years of age, and was a consistent member of the Baptist church at Hartford for a number of years. Mrs. Wedding is survived by four children, who are: Miss Mary Wedding, of Whitesville; Mrs. Georgia Keown, of Fordsville; Mr. J. B. Wedding, of Knoxville, Tenn., and J. F. Wedding, of Indianapolis, Ind. She is also survived by one brother, William Townsend, of Illinois.

The remains of Mrs. Wedding arrived in Hartford Saturday night, in charge of relatives, and her funeral occurred at the Baptist church here Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Gatlin, of Owensboro. Immediately following the services, interment took place at Oakwood.

### Charged With Seduction.

Sheriff T. H. Black went to Springfield, Ill., last Saturday, after Leslie Thomas, who had been arrested on the charge of seduction and lodged in jail in Springfield.
