Proceedings of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Plymouth in relation to a Fire Engine.

We are indebted to Mr. H. C. Burlingame, Corporation Clerk and Treasurer, for the following report of the action taken by the Board of Trustees towards purchasing a Fire Engine:

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Plymouth Corporation, held February 10, 1865, the following proceedings were had in reference to the purchase of a Fire Engine and other apparatus, building cisterns or other reservoirs, &c., for the use and benefit of the town in case of fires:

New comes Oliver H. P. Bailey, and other residents of Plymouth, and present to the Board of Trustees a petition signed by one hundred and forty-nine resident citizens, owners of taxable property in said town of Plymouth, with the affidavit of Oliver H. P. Bailey, attesting that the petitioners to said petition are genuine.

And, on motion of S. R. Edwards, it is ordered by the Board, that the sum of Six Thousand Dollars be appropriated for the purpose of buying a Fire Engine, Hose and Cart, and other suitable apparatus, also for the purpose of building cisterns and other suitable reservoirs.

And, in order to raise the money above appropriated, it is ordered, That interest bearing bonds to the amount of six thousand dollars be issued by the Board. And as many of the same as can be sold at par, be sold at private sale.
