GOOD TEMPLAR'S CONVENTION.

On Wednesday and Thursday, 24th and 25th ult., a Convention of the I. O. G. T. of the district composed of Marshall and Kosciusko counties was held at Bourbon, in Marshall county, P. G. Frary, D. G. W. C. T. Presiding.

The following preamble and resolutions after being ably discussed were adopted by unanimous vote of the Convention:

WHEREAS, The object of the I. O. G. T. in this organization, is to promote the great interests of the Temperance cause, to deliberate on the best means of saving the inebriate from destruction, and protecting young and old from the wretchedness of intemperance...

Resolved, That as an order, we urge the public to make a careful, candid investigation of the principles and laws of our order, so as to be able to judge the order, by its teachers and not by hearsay.

Resolved, That we hail with joy the coming of good which we are permitted to see in a general Temperance revival throughout our land, embracing as it does, a goodly number of our law-makers and high officials.

Resolved, That as an order, we tender to the fee of our Legislators, who battled so manfully for a prohibitory law, in the last session of our State Legislature, our hearty thanks, saying unto them "well done good and faithful servants," while to those on the other hand, who opposed, and succeeded by skulking in defeating the law, we emphatically say, "we have been weighed in the balance and found wanting."

Resolved, That we write upon our banners "Prohibition," and renew our pledge to the world and to each other, that we will never yield the strife until Indiana is freed from the "license system" which strikes at an attempt to destroy the most and the best of our land.

Resolved, That we ask the co-operation of our sister districts to unite with us in a determined effort to redeem our State from this great wrong.

Resolved, That in our opinion the time has come when as a temperance men, we can no longer conscientiously vote for men opposed directly or indirectly to this movement, and that we say to the political friends of our State, "GIVE US SOBER TEMPERANCE MEN AS CANDIDATES, OR ELSE WE WILL VOTE AGAINST THEM."

Resolved, That we recommend the holding of public meetings in every town or township, in which the above or similar resolutions shall be presented for the action of the people, so as to effect a thorough organization of the Temperance people all over the State.

Resolved, That this Convention recommend to the Lodges within the jurisdiction choose at the beginning of each term, a committee of two or more, whose duty shall be to commence legal action against all persons in the vicinity of their Lodges, who are guilty of the sale of liquors, by illegitimate means, and who are guilty of the sale of liquors, by illegitimate means, and who are guilty of the sale of liquors, by illegitimate means...

Resolved, That the thanks of the delegates and visitors to this Convention are due to, and are hereby tendered, to the members of Aurora Lodge, and the citizens of Bourbon, for their hospitality in entertaining us during our session, and that we bid them God speed in their efforts to banish intemperance from their flourishing town.

Resolved, That a copy of the resolutions adopted by this Convention be furnished to the publishers of the Marshall and Kosciusko county papers, and a copy to the Good Templar, at Indianapolis, for publication.

A Word to County Commissioners.

We have heretofore had occasion to speak of the very high rate of local taxation in many counties of this State, compared with the amount levied to carry on the State Government...

As the time is near at hand when County Boards will make their estimates and determine the amount to be levied for the current year we trust they will be impressed with the fact that this is an excellent time to reduce expenses.

Until the last debt is paid; until generous crops shall enable the farmer to pay taxes with less difficulty than now; all extraordinary expenditures that can be should be deferred.

Congress has reduced the annual tax of the General Government \$100,000,000; the Legislature has reduced the levy for State purposes twenty per cent., and if the local authorities of townships and counties will be equally considerate, they will contribute to the confidence and gratitude of those who bear the burden of taxation.

We do not expect our advice to have any influence on the local taxation of Democratic counties. The commissioners of such counties as Allen, Fountain, Floyd and Bartholomew will consider it an Abolition scheme to subvert the Constitution and destroy the liberties of this land, but we feel confident that our political friends will give it due consideration.

The Commissioners of Marshall County, we hope, will seriously consider the above suggestion. We think our County taxes inordinately and unnecessarily high. This thing of collecting from six to ten thousand dollars a year from the people, to be expended as some future time, in the erection of a Court House, is to say the least, hazardous. The money, if used for speculation or electioneering purposes by those inside the ring, will surely be squandered and lost, and the temptation to use it in one or the other, or in both of these ways, is very strong—we will not say irresistible.

If we must have a new Court House, we are in favor of commencing operations as soon as possible, so as to prevent the amount now on hand, not less than fifteen thousand dollars, it is supposed, from being squandered.

Sound Words.

The Louisville Democrat, which used to be the organ of the Kentucky Democracy before the rebellion, is the only paper professing the "time honored principles" that does not regard Democrats who went into rebellion with more favor than those who kept out of it.

In the recent Congressional canvass it made a vigorous fight against the rebel and in favor of the cause of Democratic candidates, but all to no purpose. Its venerable editor, Mr. Harney, has wisdom enough to see that the insolent effrontery of the rebel element of Kentucky and its recognition by the Northern Democracy as the Democratic party of that State, will do the former a serious injury, although its organs north of the Ohio seem too dull to appreciate the fact.

Following are some of the remarks: "We are told now how a thrill of joy is to be felt North amongst Democrats at the news from Kentucky. It will lead to 'Well, perhaps the State Sovereignty Society, Vallandigham, Henry Clay Dean and the Cincinnati Enquirer may rejoice. They have no more news. As the masses of the party, they are unfortunate in the events that occur South. They had a fair prospect of success for a time before the late elections. But since the election at Memphis and New Orleans, and the political riot so-called in Kentucky, and down the party went under these follies in the South. Now they must carry this so-called 'State Sovereignty' position, a disingenuous holding it a merit to have been engaged in the rebellion. No, not a merit to have been engaged in it, but to have sympathized with it all the way through. Those who think this will aid the Northern Democracy must have a queer idea of Northern sentiment and opinion. Whether it is right or wrong, it makes no difference; there is no use of setting up an organization here, the chief element of which did what they could to precipitate Kentucky into the rebellion, to help any party North, and to bring about a total defeat of the Democratic party North. They are not going to carry the dead rebellion and its particular friends and sympathizers."

The Democrat is right in saying that the Democrats of the North are not going to carry the dead rebellion, but it is because they are not strong enough, nor for want of inclination. They do their utmost to stand up under the load, and will hang it with as much tenacity as the shivering beggar clings to his wretched rags. There is not much reverence in the make up of the Democratic party of the Northern States, but what little they have exhavates itself on the dead rebellion, its friends and sympathizers.—Ind. Jour.

The Fort Wayne Democrat expresses a hope that the terrible drubbing its party received in the election last Tuesday, will chasten and strengthen it. We doubt such a result. The Democratic party has been chased all around the country for the last seven years, but neither its beauty nor strength has been improved by the discipline it has received. It will never be properly chastened until it is stone dead and its evil deeds are forgotten.—Ind. Jour.
