J. P. DOLLIVER TALKS
Our Congressman Delivers a Well Received Lecture.
WHAT WAR HAS DONE.
Given New Prestige at Home and Abroad, and Cemented the English Speaking Races.

Hon. J. P. Dolliver delivered a lecture down at Ocean Grove, N. J., on last Monday night and the following is a part of what he said:
"We gained in our war with Spain infinitely more than we lost and the unerring instinct of the people at large whose sovereign purpose overruled the judgment of statesmen in the initial stages of the conflict, has given us new national prestige at home and abroad—to ourselves a new basis of self-respect, to the nations of Europe a new and healthful insight into our resources and power. The world will be slow to make a quarrel with a community that can raise two hundred millions of dollars without the aid of a syndicate at home or abroad, within two weeks, by a popular loan.

"The cabinets of the old world will hold a long session before allowing themselves to be drawn into collision with a nation which, in five years, will have at its disposal a steel fleet of which the Brooklyn and the Oregon are only types and forerunners. The war has perfected our strength at home by totally obliterating the lines of sectional prejudice marked upon our map by the great struggle of the last generation.

"General Joe Wheeler, in the thick of the fight at Santiago, stands for a larger patriotism, north and south, which has turned its back upon the past and opened its vision to the sublime destiny of a reunited people. The same influences that restored perfect union to our country have brought back also that harmony to which the broad-minded men of both countries have long looked forward in the relations of the English-speaking world. At the outbreak of the Spanish war the restless diplomacy of Europe was circumvented by the prompt notice of the English government that any constraint placed by the powers upon the government of the United States would have to count upon the disapproval and active hostilities of the government and people of England, and thus by a simple act of national fellowship, the worn and threadbare prejudices of a century yield in both countries to the recognition of the common cause which the English race scattered throughout the earth, is now to make for liberty and civilization.

"The peace which is now at hand imposes upon our government a problem vastly more difficult than the prosecution of war. It puts the destinies of the Spanish West Indies at once in our hands. It gives us Porto Rico—the government of which will probably be an easy task—and requires us to establish a stable and orderly government in Cuba agreeable to the people of the island. We have already raised the flag of the United States over the Hawaiian islands, now familiar with republican institutions. Admiral Dewey, in the harbor of Manila, by the most notable exploit in the history of the navy, has brought us face to face with the problem of the Philippines. Two things the American people have already agreed upon. The first is that we ought not to desert our insurgent allies in the hour of our victory and leave them to the tender mercies of unrestrained Spanish despotism, and the second that the question is strictly an American one and that what we do shall not be constrained by the interference of any foreign power, prince or potentate, whatsoever. It may be counted as certain that the flag of the United States is in the Philippines to stay and that, whether our government assumes sovereignty over the whole group or not, we will secure such naval and commercial station there as will enable us to administer to the needs of our own commerce and become agents and guardians of the peace and liberty of the islands.

"From the beginning to the end of the war it was evident to a devout student of history that our people in a strange way have been subject to the guidance of powers wiser than any human foresight and that we have come to our present situation in the providence of God. Without our knowing it or intending it, we have been caught in the current, in what our forefathers used to call the course of human events. Up to this hour we have discharged every duty with heroism and self-sacrifice that has taken no thought for ourselves. It cannot be doubted that the president of the United States, secure in the confidence of all people, without regard to politics, will go forward in the discharge of every duty which arises out of our new relations to the civilization of the world; and behind him will stand the united millions of our people ready for duty, as old Bismarck once said, 'In the fear of God and nothing else.'"

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.
To the Republican Electors of the State of Iowa.—There will be a delegate convention of the Republicans of Iowa held in the city of Dubuque, Ia., on Thursday, September 1, 1898, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination a candidate for secretary of state, treasurer of state, auditor of state, judge of the supreme court, reporter of the supreme court, attorney general, railroad commissioner to fill vacancy, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before a republican state convention.
All voters of the state believing in republican principles and who endorse the policy of the republican party are invited to unite under this call for the election of delegates to said convention. The ratio of representation will be as follows:
One delegate at large from each county, and one additional delegate for each two hundred (200) votes or fraction of one hundred (100) or over, cast for L. M. Shaw, republican candidate for governor at the election of 1897. It is especially recommended that the several counties of the state reorganize their county committees at the convention held for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention. IOWA DAY AT OMAHA IS FIXED.
The Date Set Definitely for September 21—
Programme is Being Arranged.
Iowa day at the Trans-Mississippi exposition has been definitely set for September 21.
For Iowa day there will be a big parade, starting from the downtown district at 1 o'clock. It is expected that this procession will extend from the starting point to the exposition grounds, a distance of two and one half miles. Cities and counties of the state that have uniformed bands will be invited and expected to be present and participate, the plan being to have the bands head the various city and county delegations, which will be designated by banners. Governor Shaw and staff, the cavalry company from Des Moines, cadets from the Agricultural college, the Crocker brigade, which meets in Jefferson on the day previous and will go from there, and 100 to 150 carriages from Council Bluffs will all be in line. The Iowa citizens now residents of Omaha will also be invited to participate in a body.
Members of bands will be admitted free of charge to the grounds, and where communities purchase a certain number of tickets it is probable the railways will carry the bands free. The committee hopes to secure a flat rate of 1 cent per mile from all portions of the state for this occasion.
In the forenoon of Iowa day a concert will be rendered in the Iowa building from 8 a. m. until the procession reaches the grounds. The ladies' band of Eldora will take part and a pipe organ recital will be given.
After the grand parade to and through the grounds, and along the midway, exercises will be held at the Iowa building, commencing at 2:30. The programme will consist of an address by Gov. Shaw, response by President Wattles of the exposition, an oration by Congressman Robert G. Cousins of this district, with a fine musical programme in connection, for which arrangements are now being made. In the evening there will be an illumination of the Iowa building and fireworks.
