

The church was well filled with a very appreciative audience who listened with marked attention to the speaker. Dr. Greene is surely a speaker of rare ability. His address was logical and to the point. He dwelt at length on the fact that this nation would from now on be recognized by all the world, as leader in all scientific achievements and progress of a commercial nature. The speaker spoke of the United States as a nation of destiny. Dr. Greene is a candidate for bishop of Iowa, to succeed Bishop Perry, deceased, and all who heard him testify that he is in every way well fitted for the position.

**DIED.**  
DUNBAR—On Tuesday, Aug. 9, 1898, at five o'clock p. m., Mr. J. B. Dunbar, aged 55 years, 6 months and 11 days.

The deceased, while out driving some weeks ago, was severely hurt in a runaway, being thrown from a buggy, from which he never recovered. He was a man of strong will power, and fought very bravely against giving up his work. However he finally took to his bed and a complication of diseases carried him away.

J. B. Dunbar was born in Swanton, Franklin county, Vermont, Nov. 29, 1842. At the age of fifteen he began the apprenticeship in the milling trade at Burlington, Vt. Here he remained some ten years, when he went to Stanbridge, Canada, pursuing the same occupation. In 1859 he went to Minnesota, where he acted as scout and farming instructor for an Indian agency. After spending two years in Min-

nesota he returned to Vermont, and located at West Berkshire, where he engaged in the milling business, forming a partnership with Moses Catlin. In 1871 their business was destroyed by fire, and two years later the deceased came to Iowa and to Crawford county. He immediately engaged in the grain business with Clement Bros, and later represented the firm of Heffelfinger & McKim in the milling business. In 1891 he became a partner with Mr. Chas. Bullock in the real estate and collection business.

Mr. Dunbar was married to Mrs. Grace Phelps, who still survives him. Four children were born to them but have been called to Heaven where the father now joins them.

Mr. Dunbar will only be remembered as an honest, upright man, a friend to everyone and an enemy to none. He leaves friends all over the county who will deeply mourn his loss, and all join in sympathizing with the bereaved wife who is now left alone.

The funeral which took place from the First Baptist church was largely attended. The floral offerings were very beautiful. Rev. Nash, who had been the deceased's former pastor, was present and offered a very touching prayer. Rev. Venting, also a former pastor, and a very warm friend of Mr. Dunbar, delivered the funeral sermon, in very sympathetic and well chosen words. Rev. Bateson also spoke very feelingly and in choice words comforted the beloved widow. Miss Sarah Temple, whom Mr. Dunbar loved to hear sing, sang a solo, one he so delighted in hearing. The choir was composed of Mrs. Philbrook, Mrs. Voss, Mrs. Plimpton, Misses Temple, Nettie Kelly and Haskin, and Messrs. Norman, McFerry, Carpenter, Philbrook, Robert Plimpton and M. E. Jones. After the sermon a privilege was given all those who desired to take a last look at the well known face, after which the remains were carried to the Denison cemetery where interment took place with the most impressive ceremonies.

The deceased was a member of Camp No. 315, Modern Woodmen of America, and the organization attended the funeral in a body.
