DEMOCRATS MEET.

Denison Witnesses a Fierce Struggle For Office.

ROMANS IS DICTATOR.

Wright, Carey, Kruger, Criswell, Gigax and Smith the Candidates Nominated.

The Democratic county convention was largely attended. Of its results the democrats are themselves the best judges. Whether the whole was the result of a ring or not they know and none better. The candidates are fairly good men. Col. Wright is well known, as is also the REVIEW's opinion of him. Carey has been nine years in the court house and he had a narrow escape from defeat. Kruger had the easiest victory. Gigax was a new man brought out to defeat Herman Schultz. Criswell and Smith were in line for renomination and both got it.

The Romans, Wright, Kruger, Gigax combination won. The democrats of the county may bow down to Romans. The tables showing the vote are given below, we would advise each democrat to cut them out and paste them in his hat, they will show who did the business.

The Proceedings.

At 11:25 o'clock County Chairman P. J. Farrelly called the convention to order and announced that Mr. W. A. Davie, of Boyer township, had been selected as temporary chairman.

Mr. Davie took the platform and said:

"Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the convention.—It is customary when a man is called upon like this to make a speech. I want to say I am not prepared for a speech, and when I gaze over this assembly and see the character of it I don't believe a speech is necessary.

I believe in Crawford county we have now nearer complete harmony than we have ever had before. In the past there have been factions. Time has removed the sore spots and we are here united and anxious to secure candidates to strengthen the ticket. We came here for the party and not for the individual. Sometimes in our own particular location we may think our candidate is the only man; in the convention we may see things differently, when it is our duty to acquiesce in the opinion of the majority.

Gentlemen, what is your further pleasure?

On call for a secretary Mr. Van Slyke of Manilla was suggested, but as he was not a delegate his name was withdrawn, and that of F. A. Jackson of Manilla substituted. Mr. Jackson was chosen.

It was moved and carried that a committee of three on credentials be appointed. The chair appointed G. D. Brokaw of Manilla, Chas. Smith of Denison and W. W. Cushman of Charter Oak.

A committee on permanent organization was voted for and appointed, as follows: W. Schacht, of Iowa; A. H. Rudd of Dow City and Hans Suhr of West Side.

On resolutions the following were appointed: J. B. Romans, W. W. Rhodenbaugh and E. W. Houston.

On motion G. L. Caswell was made assistant secretary of the convention. Adjourned at 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Report of the Committees on Credentials, Organization and Resolutions.

It was 1:50 o'clock before the afternoon session was called to order. The delegates and candidates had improved the noon recess well and all were busy as bees fixing up their fences and getting ready for the great struggle of the afternoon.

On convening the report of the committee on credentials was called for, and was read by W. W. Cushman, finding all townships and precincts represented.

The Resolutions.

Resolved, by the democrats of Crawford county in regular convention assembled that we reassert and reaffirm our faith in the democratic party, its measures, policies and leaders, and again declare our faith in the party platform adopted in Chicago in 1896.

Resolved that in W. J. Bryan we recognize a true leader of the common people, whose heart is with his country and who sympathizes with the cause of humanity and justice always and everywhere.

Resolved that we oppose all alliance with Great Britain or any other European monarchy, and remember the warning of the immortal Washington against any entangling alliance.

Resolved, That we favor the renomination of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 without asking England or her tory-American allies whether it suits them or not.

Resolved, That we are opposed to National banks and National bonds, and believe in full legal tender paper money issued by the government, bearing no interest and interchangeable with gold or silver at the option of the government.

Resolved, That peace having been secured, Spain should be compelled to abandon her possessions in America and permit her former colonies to choose their own form of government by (as Jefferson said) the free consent of the governed.

Resolved, That we favor the political measure known as the referendum, which requires that all legislation affecting the whole people must first be submitted to their approval, and the people's verdict shall not be reconsidered in any court, but shall become law.

Resolved, That we favor a reasonable, rigid economy in county affairs and a frequent and close scrutiny in the conduct of public servants occupying positions of trust or profit in the county.

All the testimony of recent events in the war with Spain make it the imperative duty of every loyal and patriotic citizen to most emphatically condemn the official corruption and negligence which has transformed our volunteer soldiers, the very flower and pride of our commonwealth, from healthy, hearty young men into broken spirited and disease burdened human beings. We believe and declare that the government should investigate, condemn and punish every act of official negligence and carelessness which has robbed our men of health or helped to send them to untimely graves while under the care and within the environments of their own county.

BRAVE LANCERS.

Gallant Charge They Made on Big Force of Dervishes Before Omdurman.

London, Sept. 5.—Dispatches from Omdurman relate that the newspaper correspondent, Howard, who was afterwards killed, rode in the gallant charge of the "Twenty-first lancers. These troops were scouting, when they saw in the bush between 600 and 700 dervishes. The lancers charged the enemy, and suddenly found themselves face to face with 2,000 swordsmen, being thus outnumbered at least four to one. The dervishes were hidden from view in a hollow. The lancers charged through them, reformed and charged back to recover their wounded, who were being savagely slaughtered.

The official list gives the number of British officers killed in the capture of Omdurman as two, while 13 were wounded. Of the men, 23 were killed and 99 were wounded. The loss sustained by the Egyptians was: Officers, one killed and eight wounded; men, 20 killed and 221 wounded. Col. Rhodes, a brother of Cecil Rhodes and correspondent of the London Times, was severely wounded, a bullet having struck him in the shoulder.
