Dr. H. A. Boyle returned on Friday night from his work as assistant surgeon of the 50th Iowa. Dr. Boyle was at Camp Cuba Libre and had every opportunity to see the conditions of the camp. He states that everything possible was done for the boys in camp, and that the fare was good and plentiful. He tells many interesting details of camp life and states that malarial and typhoid fevers were the two most prevalent diseases. He does not think the typhoid comes from the water, but from other sources. Dr. Boyle had charge of two carloads of sick and convalescent soldiers on the return trip to Iowa. The men were given the best accommodations that money could buy. They rode in Pullman cars and were accompanied by trained nurses. A sum of money was placed in the doctor's hands with orders to purchase anything the sick ones might need. He telegraphed ahead to every place where one of the boys was to be left and had carriages waiting to take them to their homes. All of the men under his care reached their homes in safety, although some were seriously ill. This state of affairs is certainly a credit not only to Dr. Boyle but to the government which takes such care of its men.

COMMITTED SUICIDE

Ed Huffman, of Charter Oak, Takes His Own Life.

DIED IN GREAT AGONY.

Took Strychnine Last Sunday and Died Within Fifteen Minutes—No Motive is Known as Yet.

Edward Huffman living four and one-half miles east of Charter Oak, committed suicide on Sunday by taking strychnine mixed with alcohol and water. The deed was done at his home, only his step-daughter, a girl of seventeen being present. It is said that he had been drinking heavily the day before and that he was crazed by drink. The deceased had not lived in this county many years. He was employed on the farm of Mr. Bogelman and after his employer's death he married Mrs. Bogelman, some three years ago. The step-daughter who was present tried to prevent him from taking the fatal dose, but he was determined and finally drank such an amount that he died within fifteen minutes in great agony. The girl hastened to Charter Oak, but the unfortunate man was dead long before help arrived.

He was about 40 years of age and little seems to be known about him in Charter Oak. The funeral occurred today.
