



TROOPS TO LEAVE SOON.

Within Ten Days United States Soldiers Will Go to Havana Province.

ARRANGEMENTS ARE NOW BEING MADE.

Occupation of Cienfuegos Also Receiving Attention - No News from the Detachment of the Eighth Cavalry Sent to Nuevitas and Porto Principe.

Washington, Nov. 17.—The movement of the United States troops to Havana province will begin within ten days. The exact date of their arrival will be determined by the reports of Maj. Gen. Greene, who commands a division of the Seventh corps, and is now in Havana, on business connected with garrisoning that province, and of Gen. Charles F. Humphrey and Col. Hecker of the quartermaster's department. These officers have authority to complete arrangements for the reception of the troops, the quartermaster's officers being engaged in the supervision of the construction of wharves and depots to be used by the army.

The occupation of Cienfuegos is also receiving attention. Gen. Snyder will command the First brigade which lands in that province. He will be followed soon afterwards by Maj. Gen. Wilson, of the First corps. Nothing has been heard of the detachments of the Eighth cavalry, which sailed for Nuevitas and Porto Principe, but as there is no telegraphic communication with that part of the island, no surprise is manifested at the war department.

IN BAD SHAPE.

Receiver of Emporia Bank Funds Capital and Surplus Practically Wiped Out.

Washington, Nov. 17.—A telegram has been received by Mr. Dawes, the comptroller of the currency, from the receiver in charge of the First national bank at Emporia, Kan., saying that so far his investigation has developed irregularities in the reserve agent's accounts amounting to \$50,000; \$15,000 in the cash accounts, and that the bank had invested in doubtful enterprises controlled by President Cross approximately \$150,000. It is thought by the officials in the comptroller's office that although the capital and surplus of the bank are entirely wiped out, the bank depositors will suffer little if any loss.

Emporia, Kan., Nov. 17.—The streets were crowded Thursday with depositors of the closed First national bank, whose president, Charles S. Cross, took his life soon after that institution was taken charge of by a receiver. Many of the depositors had come in from the country. There was little or no excitement, however, the tragic suicide of President Cross engrossing the most of the conversation. Cross carried from \$60,000 to \$70,000 life insurance.



THE NEW "MAINE"

The accepted plans for the new battleship Maine, and her sister ships, the Ohio and the Missouri, call for a ship of approximately 12,150 tons, with a water-line length of 388 feet, beam, 72 feet, and draught 24 feet 6 inches, with full turrets, supplies and ammunition, and a guaranteed speed of 18 knots, at a cost of \$2,885,000. In appearance, according to Harper's Weekly, the Maine, Ohio and Missouri, up to the top of the superstructure, and as far as the armament is concerned, are identical with the Illinois, Wisconsin and Alabama. They will carry four 18-inch breech-loading rifles, paired in elliptical turrets forward and aft, 14 6-inch rapid-fire guns in the broadside batteries, and 24 rapid-fire and machine guns in the secondary battery, mounted at various points throughout the ship. For armor, these ships the original 10 1/2-inch Harveyized armor plating will be superseded by 10-inch Kruppized plating, which admits of a broader and longer belt for the same weight of steel.

Caught After Two Years.

Wolverton was traced by correspondence between himself and his brother at Cambridge, Ia.

First Illinois Mustered Out.

Chicago, Nov. 17.—Battle-scarred soldiers of the First Illinois volunteer infantry were released from federal service and stepped back into the ranks of the Illinois national guard. Capt. Wainwright, of the regular cavalry, distributed the honorable discharges from government service and Maj. E. A. Bigelow, paymaster, counted out over \$100,000 to the boys of Santiago and Siboney as they filed by his table on the first balcony.

Miss Annie Bayard Dead.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 17.—Miss Annie Frances Bayard, whose death is reported at Algiers, is the second daughter of the late Thomas F. Bayard, of this city. Miss Bayard, who was known as "Miss Nanrie," had been absent from here for years, and had been living with her sister, Countess Lewinhaupt, in Paris. She went to Algiers for her health, accompanied by Philip Bayard, youngest son of the late ambassador.

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—The police department of this city has received a dispatch from Manchester, N. H., asking them to hold Henry Biville, alias Targares, alias Henry W. Beaumont, as he is wanted there for grand larceny. Biville was recently arrested in this city for swindling several men out of considerable money.

Sale of Choice Herefords.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 17.—A two-days' sale of Hereford cattle from the farms of Gudgeon and Simpson, Independence, Mo., and James A. Funkhouser, Plattsburg, Mo., has closed at the Kansas City stock yards, 97 head having been disposed of at an average price of \$278.25 per head.

Danville, Ill., Nov. 17.—John Johnson was sentenced to hang for the murder of Ballard Johnson at a dance in Grape creek on May 5. Marty, his accomplice, was given 14 years.

Sandusky, O., Nov. 17.—The Canadian cruiser Petrel, which is patrolling the fishing grounds in Lake Erie waters in this vicinity, has seized a lot of gill nets belonging to American fishermen and which it is claimed were set in Canadian waters.

Hearing Postponed.

Columbus, O., Nov. 17.—The hearing of the contempt proceedings against the Buckeye Pipe Line company was postponed until November 25 by the Ohio supreme court on application of Hon. Virgil P. Kline, attorney for the defense.

Petition for a Receiver.

Wichita, Kan., Nov. 17.—A petition has been filed in the United States circuit court here for a receiver for the Hutchinson & Southern railway by Mrs. Kate A. Bennett, a stockholder, who alleges fraud.

New Fast Train.

Columbus, O., Nov. 17.—The Pennsylvania system will on next Sunday inaugurate a new fast mail train from St. Louis to New York which will carry sleeping and dining cars.
