EDITORIAL COLUMN

The Territory of Hawaii.

One of the perplexing questions which is to come before the present Congress is the new constitution for the government of the territory of Hawaii. This is the first attempt made by the United States in colonial rule, for although the islands are to be styled a "territory" and are to have a representative in congress, they come, from their location and the character of their population, distinctly under the head of a colony. As in the territories the President is to appoint the Governor and a number of federal officers. The Governor has the appointment of the Attorney General, treasurer, superintendent of public works, superintendent of instruction, the auditor and his deputy, surveyor and chief sheriff. President Dole of the former republic dissents from this, urging that too much power is placed in the Governor's hands. We believe he is right in this respect for if the people have sufficient intelligence to elect a legislature they should have sufficient to elect their territorial officers.

Other provisions of the proposed constitution are as follows: "All white persons, including Portuguese, and persons of African descent, and all persons descending from the Hawaiian race on either paternal or maternal side, who were citizens of the republic of Hawaii immediately prior to the transfer of the sovereignty thereof to the United States, are hereby declared citizens of the United States."

Provision is made for a legislature of two houses, a senate of thirty members and a house of representatives of 150 members, to be elected the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1899, and biennially thereafter. The supreme court is made the sole judge of the legality of the election in case of contest.

A senator must be a male citizen 30 years old, having lived three years in the territory, the owner of \$2,000 worth of property, or having an income of \$1,000 per year.

A representative must be 25 years old, own property or have an income of \$250 per year.

Voters for representatives must be male citizens 21 years of age, one year in the territory, to have registered, paid all taxes and be able to understand, speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian language.

The qualifications for voters for senator includes all the above and to own \$1,000 worth of real estate, or an income of \$600.

Provision is also made for the election of a delegate to the house of representatives in the congress of the United States, who is given the same powers as delegates from other territories.

The governor is to appoint a chief justice, two associate justices of the supreme court, judges of the circuit court, members of the board of health, commissioners of public instruction, prison inspectors, boards of registration, inspectors of election and other public boards. He is to possess the veto power, which may be overridden by a vote of two-thirds of the legislature.

Foreign goods imported into the islands after July 7, 1898, and afterwards brought to the United States, are to pay the same duties as if imported direct. The existing laws of Hawaii, not inconsistent with those of the United States, are to continue in force.

The laws of the United States, locally applicable, are to have the same force as in the United States.

While we do not pretend to set our judgment against that of commissioners who have made this a study, we must say that the idea of a property qualification for suffrage is distasteful and entirely un-American. Local conditions may be such as to render this necessary, to a certain degree, but we fail to see why a different qualification should be made between representative and senatorial electors. This question should

receive the serious consideration of congress and it doubtless will.

The Emperor William.

One of the most unique figures in European politics is Emperor William of Germany. When he first took the throne it was prophesied that dire disaster would befall him and his empire. Since that time all his eccentricities have been held up to public ridicule, but the fact remains that he took hold of a newly formed empire, an empire composed of almost as many discordant elements as is the Austrian empire, and that he has not only held these discordant elements together, but that during his reign the empire has made steady advancement in power and wealth, both at home and abroad.

The reign of William would be intolerable in America, but we must judge him not by American but by European standards. The present emperor was at the commencement of his reign completely overshadowed by the memory of his illustrious grandfather, and the beloved Unser Fritz, and by the great figure of the Fuehrer von Bismarck.

It was noted at once that the new emperor was restive under the laudations bestowed upon his predecessors and the Iron Chancellor. This was ascribed to petty personal jealousy, but it may be a better judgment to say that William understood that in order to rule over such an empire, the personal element must be strongly felt. He must be THE emperor, not to gratify personal vanity, but in order that his mandates might be obeyed.

Thus in less than half a century Germany has risen from a mass of loosely confederated kingdoms and principalities and dukedoms, to one of the strongest central governments of the old world. If it requires a man of strength to be president of the United States and to deal with governors and senators, what must it require to be emperor of Germany and have to deal with kings and princes and potentates of equal lineage and equal pride as himself. We are not hero worshipping, we are cognizant of the emperors weaknesses. We know that he is un-American but we also know that he has done for Germany what none but a man of strength and character could have accomplished.

A Timely Warning.

THE REVIEW has been warned that Colonel Economy Wright is after us; that he is desperate because the REVIEW has told the truth about his salary grab, and is seeking for gore.

We do not intend to persecute the Colonel, but we do intend to tell the truth about him. So long as he keeps his record clear he has nothing to fear.

He accepted the nomination, knowing what the salary of the office was. He went through the county preaching economy—and then before he had filed his official bond, before he knew from experience what amount of labor the office involved, he calmly asked the board to raise his salary to an extent which will cost the county from \$200 to \$250 additional ever year. It is much easier to raise a salary than to cut it down, and the chances are this extra expense will be saddled on the county for all time to come.

Of course it is a small matter, only \$250 a year more for the people to pay, but unless someone makes the facts known who can tell where this sort of economy will stop. Let Colonel Economy do the right thing, let him tell the board that he will be satisfied with the

salary as it was when he was elected. Let him do this, and keep on doing the right thing and he need not fear attacks from any source. But let him or any other county officer attempt to gouge the county out of the peoples' hard earned money, and no amount of bulldozing will stop the REVIEW from telling the people. Don't get desperate, Colonel. Put up your shotgun. Perhaps people will stop laughing at you if you will. But above all things, do the square thing, don't take the money you worked the board for, and then you need fear no attack, and no persecution (?) can do you harm.

In order to show the people just what there is in this salary grab we give the figures showing what has been paid and what the Colonel is to get



New York, Dec. 5. — Sunday night's storm played havoc with many of the telegraph wires running out of New York. The sleet and snow which accompanied it in the region known to telegraph men as the "lake region," including the territory from Buffalo to Chicago, along the Lake Shore and other railroads, was responsible for the most distressing delay which the companies experienced.

Both through and local service to all points was effective Monday morning, although business was accepted "subject to delay."

Every direct route is open except that between Butler, Pa., and Chicago. Along the lake region the Western Union is hampered materially, the lines which run beside the Pittsburgh & Western and the Ohio division of the Erie suffering the greatest delays. Business for Chicago and points west of that city is being carried forward, about one-quarter of the usual number of wires being effective. The work of replacing the wires is being carried through with as much expediency as possible, and it is confidently expected to have the whole system in working order by Tuesday morning, with the exception of the wires in the lake region, where the sleet has complicated the damage.
