CALVIN S. BRICE DEAD.

Passes Away at New York City After an Illness of Less Than a Week.

THE RESULT OF A VERY SEVERE COLD.

Had Been One of Leaders of Democratic Party—Was Elected to Senate from Ohio in 1890, Where He Was Member of Democratic Steering Committee.

New York, Dec. 15.—Calvin S. Brice died at 3:15 o'clock Thursday afternoon in this city. Mr. Brice contracted a severe cold one week ago. On Friday last he went down town to his office, returning home in a suffering condition, and on Saturday



day took to his bed. He grew steadily worse until Thursday afternoon when he died.

His Career.

IS PASSED WITH A RUSH.

Action in the General Pension Bill by the House Emphasizes How Times Have Changed.

Washington, Dec. 15.—The house Thursday adopted the conference report on the bill extending the marine inspection laws to sailing vessels of 700 tons and over, and providing for the licensing of second and third mates.

Mr. Barney (rep., Wis.), in charge of the pension appropriation bill, then called up this measure and made a general explanatory statement of its provisions.

Mr. Allen (dem., Miss.), of the appropriations committee, in reply to Mr. Barney, called attention to the fact that when he first came to congress, 14 years ago, the pension appropriation bill invariably precipitated a bloody-shirt discussion. He congratulated the country that congress had progressed since then and that there would be no acrimonious discussion on this bill. The country at last had the gratifying information that the pension roll had reached the maximum. "And I congratulate the country for this," said Mr. Allen, in conclusion, "that while one of the most gallant and desperate soldiers of the confederacy (himself) helped to report this bill, the president of the United States is down in Dixie doing honor to the confederate dead. We all have cause to rejoice." (Laughter and applause). There was no further debate upon the bill. It was read through without a word of criticism and passed, the whole time occupied in its consideration being less than 20 minutes. This is the shortest time on record for a general pension bill. The bill carries \$145,233,830.





ISLA DE CUBA, NOW OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY.



The Isla de Cuba, one of the cruisers sunk by Admiral Dewey in the battle of Manila on May 1 last, and which he subsequently caused to be raised, started for Hong Kong under her own steam. The vessel is of 1,030 tons displacement and 2,200 indicated horse power. The Isla de Luzon, also raised recently, made a trial trip across the bay, which was very satisfactory. The third recovered Spanish vessel, the Don Juan de Austria, will soon follow the others to Hong Kong.

the civil war he entered Miami university, but in 1851 he enlisted in a university company, for the war. He served in West Virginia in the Ninety-sixth Ohio infantry. In 1863 he graduated from the university, and after teaching school a few months he became captain of a company in the One Hundred and Eighth Ohio and served to the end of the war. He then went to Ann Arbor (Mich.) law school and afterwards was admitted to the bar in Cincinnati.

Active Interest in Politics.

He took an active interest in politics, and in the campaign of 1876 he was an electoral candidate on the Tilden ticket and again on the Cleveland ticket in 1884. In 1888 he was a delegate at large to the democratic national convention at St. Louis, where the Ohio delegation chose him as a member of the national committee. He was chairman of the executive committee during the 1888 campaign and, on the death of William H. Barnum, was elected chairman of the democratic national committee. In the winter of 1890 Mr. Brice was elected United States senator to succeed Henry B. Payne, and took his seat March 4, 1891. In the senate Mr. Brice became a prominent figure. He was soon made a member of the democratic steering committee and became also a member of the committee on appropriations. Mr. Brice seldom spoke in the senate, but was a close observer of everything that was going on and was always deep in the councils of the party.

Order Restored.

Santa Fe, N. M., Dec. 15.—Reports from Taos received Thursday are to the effect that since the arrival of a deputy United States marshal on the scene order has been restored. The trouble originated from a drunken deputy sheriff's treatment of two tourists watching a church procession in celebration of San Guadelupe day.

Found Buried in Hog Pen.

Franklin, Neb., Dec. 15.—The body of Peter Kreichbaum, the wealthy farmer who disappeared mysteriously early last week, was found buried in the hog pen on his farm, three miles south of this place. The coroner has impounded a jury and will at once begin an investigation.

Must Serve Her Sentence.

Des Moines, Ia., Dec. 15.—On the second appeal of the case the supreme court has decided that Betsy Smith must serve her life sentence in the penitentiary for the murder of her husband, Michael Smith, for insurance money.

o'clock in order to permit senators to attend the funeral of Mrs. Bright, wife of the sergeant-at-arms of the senate. Senator Vest made a brief personal explanation the purport of which was that he had received a letter from Attorney General Griggs denying that at a banquet in New York he had, as quoted, expressed the opinion that the constitution made for 13 half developed colonies could not reasonably be expected to meet the demands of the greatest nation in the world.

Senator Morgan presented a memorial from the National Board of Trade favorable to the construction of the Nicaragua canal, asking that the document be printed in the congressional record.

Senator Allen objected, and the objection provoked the basis of an animated discussion invoking the rules of the senate as well as the wisdom of the construction of the canal. Senator Morgan accepted the objection as an effort to obstruct the legislation for the canal and prevent the country's securing information on the subject.

Senator Allen resented this imputation, saying that he was favorable to the canal on general principles, though advocating government ownership. He predicted that the canal would cost \$500,000,000.

Detains Japanese Laborers.

San Francisco, Dec. 15.—United States Immigration Commissioner North has detained for examination 35 Japanese contract laborers who have arrived here on the Pacific Island company's steamer Alice Blanchard, from the Clipperton Guano islands. The men were hired at Honolulu and their term of contract has not yet expired.

Brings Treasure.

San Francisco, Dec. 15.—The steamer Alameda, from Australia, brought treasure amounting to \$3,510,000. There were 120 boxes of English sovereigns, 5,000 sovereigns in a box, and 24 boxes filled with bullion. The money is to settle in part the balance of trade between this country and England.

To Be Mustered Out.

San Francisco, Dec. 15.—The Sixth regiment of California volunteers, located at Fort Point, will be mustered out of the federal service. The Sixth was the first California regiment to be mustered into Uncle Sam's service and will be the first to be mustered out.

Must Hang.

Springfield, Ill., Dec. 15.—The supreme court has denied the motion for a writ of error and supersedeas in the case of Carter Martin, under sentence to hang at Charleston Friday.
