THE GOVERNOR'S RECEPTION.

Greatest Affair of the Kind Ever Given in the State.—Gov. and Mrs. Shaw Very Popular.

The reception given by Governor and Mrs. Shaw at the Savery House in Des Moines last Wednesday was the largest and most brilliant affair of the kind that Iowa has ever witnessed. On Tuesday representative men and women began arriving from nearly every county in the state. Democrats and republicans alike were recipients of the governor's invitations and the hotel lobby looked as though a joint convention was being held. Crawford county was represented by Dr. J. J. McWilliams and P. D. McMahon of Charter Oak, and Hon. H. C. Laub and wife Hon. C. F. Kuehnle and wife, Rev. E. E. Ilgenfritz and F. W. Meyers, of Denison, and Editor Morgan, of Manilla.

During the afternoon the corner stone of the new State Historical Building was laid by Governor Shaw and addresses were made by the venerable ex-Senator Harlan and by John A. Kasson who is Iowa's greatest contributor to the diplomacy of the world.

It is estimated that fifteen hundred people were present at the evening reception. The crush was great but it was taken good naturedly, and the evening was most enjoyably spent. The receiving line consisted of Governor and Mrs. Shaw, Senator Allison, Senator and Mrs. Gear, Ex-Senator Harlan, Ex-Gov. and Mrs. Larrabee, Ex-Gov. Drake and daughter, Ex-Gov. and Mrs. Jackson, Congressman and Mrs. D. B. Henderson, Congressman and Miss J. P. Dolliver, Congressman and Mrs. Lot Thomas, Congressmen J. F. Lacey, J. R. Lane and Thomas Hedge.

The Denison people all enjoyed themselves hugely, and were much pleased to see how highly Governor Shaw is held in the esteem of the people of Iowa.
