NORTHWESTERN'S 2nd TRACK.
The Northwestern will complete the construction of a second track on the main line the present season, from Tama City, the present terminus of the double track, to Lamaille, a distance of about thirty miles; also from Ontario, seven miles west of Ames to Boone, and from Missouri Valley to Council Bluffs, eight and twenty-two miles respectively. The great steel bridge across the Des Moines river north of Moingoina, now in the preliminary stages of construction, will not be completed before one year from next fall. The bridge will be three-quarters of a mile in length and 190 feet above the river. Its construction and the building of a track almost straight from Boone to Ogden will shorten the distance from Boone to Council Bluffs nearly five miles. The embankment forming the east approach to the bridge is 300 feet broad at the base.
