**Bad Storm at Pleasantville.**

PLEASANTVILLE, Ia., July 7.—A violent storm of wind, rain and hail passed over this place last evening, doing great damage to property. Plate glass was destroyed and shingles beaten from the roofs. Stock exposed to the storm was badly injured by the hailstones and crops are beaten to the ground.

**ORDER TO ENLIST MEN**

Ten New Regiments for Philippine Duty.

**RULES FOR ENLISTING VOLUNTEERS**

All Recruiting Stations Notified to Receive Men as if for the Regular Service. State Lines Disregarded—Recruiting Begins Next Week.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The order for the enlistment of volunteers for service in the Philippines was published yesterday and several more colonels to command the regiments were appointed. There are yet two colonels to be designated. Eight majors also were named. The recruiting will not be begun until some time next week, the exact date not having been fixed yet. Recruiting stations will be opened in every state and territory, and as fast as the men are enlisted they will be sent to the regiments to be assigned to companies. State lines are obliterated and the men first enlisted will be first to be mustered in. The assignment to companies will be by the officer commanding and he will be at liberty to organize a company composed of men from one state, if he finds it convenient and practicable. The organization of the 10 regiments in this country will not make any difference to the organization of regiments in the Philippines by General Otis. His regiments will be in addition to those hereafter to be known as the Twenty-sixth to Thirty-sixth inclusive, and will be numbered Thirty-sixth upward. It is expected that three regiments will be organized in the Philippines. The regiments organized in the United States and those in the Philippines will increase the army by 650 officers and 17,550 men, if there should be three full regiments formed by General Otis.

The colonels appointed are under orders to proceed at once with the organization of the regiments. Some of the colonels are now in the city and have been consulting some of the different bureau officers with regard to equipment and supplies for the men as they join the regiments.

**SPANISH CAPTIVES GO FREE.**

Agreement Is Made With Aguinaldo to Release Military Prisoners.

MANILA, July 7.—The Spanish commissioners who went to Tarlac for a conference with Aguinaldo regarding the surrender of the Spanish prisoners in the hands of the Filipinos returned here last night. Chairman Del Rio of the commission said the release of all the prisoners had been practically arranged for. He asserted that Aguinaldo had already issued a decree for the release of the civilian officials and the sick soldiers.

The commissioners, with the remnant of the Spanish garrison of Baler, on the east coast of Luzon, and a number of civilian prisoners, were escorted by Filipino soldiers from Tarlac to the

American outposts at San Fernando and came to Manila by the night train. The heroes of the long defense of Baler, where the Spaniards resisted an insurgent siege for more than a year, formed a picturesque band. Lieutenant Martin, the only surviving officer, marched them through the streets. There are only 23 and most of them are mere boys, in faded blue uniforms and red shirts. They are barefooted. A crowd of Spanish men and women embraced them, weeping and shouting their praises.

**TRIES TO KILL KING MILAN.**

Former Ruler of Serbia Narrowly Escapes Assassination at Belgrade.

BELGRADE, Serbia, July 7.—Former King Milan narrowly escaped assassination here last evening. The would-be murderer is under arrest. He fired four revolver shots, one of which slightly grazed his majesty, another wounding in the hand Adjutant Lukitch, who was with him.

At the time the attack was made King Milan was driving through Michael street in an open carriage. The would-be assassin is about 28 years old and has not yet been identified by the police. On his return to the palace King Milan received the congratulations of the cabinet upon his escape. Later in the evening King Alexander drove through Michael street and was enthusiastically received by the populace.

**Gets a Glimpse of Dreyfus.**

RENNES, July 7.—From a point overlooking the prison, the correspondent of the Associated Press saw Captain Dreyfus emerge into the court yard yesterday for an hour's exercise. He was dressed in a blue serge suit and wore a soft felt hat. He walked slowly across the yard, with his hands in the pockets of his jacket. His head was slightly bent forward, so that it was impossible to see the features. As he crossed the yard he was preceded and followed by a prison warden. The three passed through another door leading to a garden in the center of the prison, where Dreyfus takes exercise, and disappeared.

**Queen Entertains Peace Delegates.**

AMSTERDAM, July 7.—Queen Wilhelmina arrived here yesterday and amid a great popular demonstration proceeded to the palace. The members of the international peace conference arrived from The Hague at 6:30 p. m. by special train and proceeded from the station directly to the palace, where they were received by the queen, after which they were entertained at a magnificent banquet in the palace.

**Taylor Wins Mile Championship.**

ST. LOUIS, July 7.—A very fair crowd was present at Athletic park yesterday to see the postponed national bicycle races run off. All the events were interesting. The 1-mile championship went to Major Taylor, the colored rider, who had some trouble beating Charley McCarthy of St. Louis and Woodward of Detroit in the final.

A terrible wind and hail storm Thursday devastated the country for miles around Kendall, Wis. It ruined large tracts of valuable timber.

**Fistic Carnival at Dubuque.**

DUBUQUE, July 6.—The Dubuque Athletic club was organized yesterday. John P. Lux of Dubuque was made president and L. M. Houseman of Chicago secretary and general manager. The opening show will consist of a three-days' carnival, Aug. 29, 30 and 31. Root and Byers have been matched to decide the middleweight championship of America. Propositions for matches have also been made by several of the best known pugilists, including George Dixon, Peter Maher and Joe Choynski.

**Dies From the Shock.**

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., July 6.—Steven L. Dows, Jr., died yesterday of alcoholism and from the effects of the shock upon realization of the fact that he had shot his brother. It developed that it was while he was insane from the effect of liquor that he shot his brother, Colonel Dows, on Monday evening. The colonel was trying to disarm him when the weapon was discharged. The deceased was a member of one of the most prominent and highly respected families in Iowa and the whole city is shocked at his tragic end.

**Iowa Christians Name a Ticket.**

DES MOINES, July 5.—The United Christian party of Iowa met here yesterday and nominated the following ticket: For governor, C. D. Heacock of Brighton; judge of supreme bench, John M. Helmick of Dubuque; superintendent of public instruction, W. C. Pidgeon of Richland. The following resolution was adopted: We believe in direct legislation, and in order to make a government, a government from God through Christ, we should be governed in all things, lawmaking included, by the standard: "What would Jesus do?" A national convention will be held today.

**SHOOTS AN OLD MAN DEAD.**

Young Albert Johnson Kills Aged John Camerer Near Salix, Ia.

SIoux CITY, July 7.—As the result of a neighborhood feud extending over the last five years, John Camerer, residing near Salix, in Woodbury county, is dead, having been shot by Albert Johnson, a young man.

The trouble between the Camerer and Johnson families started over a boundary line between their farms. Several times have they come to blows and more than once have weapons been brought into play. Another row occurred about a month ago, but at that time nothing of a serious nature occurred. Yesterday afternoon Camerer, who is about 60 years of age, got very drunk. He went home and, loading up his shotgun, went over to the Johnson home. Chris Johnson, with his wife and children, were in the house at the time. Camerer stole up to the window of the house and putting the muzzle of the gun inside, fired both barrels. Neither one took effect. In an instant young Albert Johnson jumped up and seizing the family shotgun, rushed outside. He fired two shots at Camerer, both taking effect. The old man died at once.
