## KILLED BY THE CARS.

Unfortunate Man Falls Under the Wheels Near Charter Oak—Head Completely Severed.

Coroner M. N. Smith was called to Charter Oak Sunday to attend to the case of a man named Michael Gorrigan who was killed by the cars while stealing a ride between Ute and Charter Oak. The unfortunate man was riding on the bumpers between two freight cars and in some way lost his balance and fell under the wheels. His body was horribly mangled, the arms and legs being cut off and the head being completely severed from the body. His companion testified that Gorrigan had been unwell and thinks that he fell while in a fainting spell. The deceased had a brother living in Jackson, Mich., and he wastelegraphed, but no response has been received up this writing. It seems that nearly the entire train went over the poor fellow. The coroners jury brought in a verdict in accord with the above statement and exonerated the Milwaukee Railway from any blame in the matter. It would seem that these terrible accidents would serve as a warning but the number of men who would rather take such chances than to pay fare seems to be on the increase.

## Ordinance No. 144.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR TRIMMING OF TREES ON ALL STREETS AND ALLIES IN THE CITY OF DENISON.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Denison, Iowa,

SEC. I. That all trees standing on any street or park or along any street or sidewalk in said city, shall be trimmed so that the space from the ground to the limbs on all trees shall not be less than eight feet.

SEC. II. And it is further ordained that any trees or limbs of any trees that extend over the street or sidewalk so that it obstructs the street lights, shall be trimmed so as not to obstruct said street lights.

SEC. III. That any or all trees, as herein provided, that obstruct the sidewalk or street in said city, shall be deemed a nuisance and shall be abated by service of a notice by the street commissioner or any member of street committee, upon each property owner or agent to trim said trees or limbs as provided in sections one and two of this ordinance, and if any property owner or agent fail to trim said trees or limbs within five days after being notified as herein provided, then the street commissioner or any member of street committee shall have the power to trim said trees or limbs and charge the expense to the property owner, as provided by law.

SEC. 4. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect after being published in the Denison Review and Denison Bulletin.

## Ordinance No. 145.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 2 OF ORDINANCE NO. 92 ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE GRADE ON WALNUT STREET WEST OF MAIN STREET.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Denison, Iowa:

SEC. I. That section 2 of ordinance No. 92 be amended as follows:

SEC. II. That the elevation of the grade of Walnut street 80 feet west of the west side of Main street,

Midway between Main street and Dyer street  
North side 55.80 feet,  
South side 51 feet,  
Northeast corner Dyer street 59 feet,  
Northwest corner Dyer street 63 feet,  
Southeast corner Dyer street 55 feet,  
Midway between Dyer and Anthony streets  
North side 68 feet,  
South side 62 feet,  
Northeast corner Anthony street 74 feet,  
Northwest corner Anthony street 74 feet,  
Southwest corner Anthony street 67 feet,  
Southeast corner Anthony street 67 feet,  
Midway between Anthony and Hoppin street  
North side 78 feet,  
South side 73 feet,  
Northeast corner Hoppin street 82 feet,  
Northwest corner Hoppin street 86 feet,  
Southeast corner Hoppin street 78 feet,  
Southwest corner Hoppin street 81 feet,  
Midway between Hoppin and Howard streets  
North side 86 feet,  
South side 81 feet,  
Northwest corner Howard street 81 feet,  
Southwest corner Howard street 78 feet.

SEC. III. That section 2 of ordinance No. 92 and all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
