**SHAW AT DOW CITY.**

Governor Shaw will speak at Green's Hall in Dow City on Friday evening, September 15th. This will be one of the first speeches of the campaign and we trust that there will be a large attendance. Gov. Shaw is a fair man, he will be fair in his utterances, and it would be well for men of both parties to hear his discussion of the issues of the day.

**ANOTHER HOLDUP.**

On Saturday morning while Marshal John Muir was escorting a couple of tramps out of town, he found a man lying by the railroad track near the McHenry stock farm. The poor fellow was badly cut up, he had a great welt on his head, his ear was cut and his eye badly damaged. Mr. Muir brought the man up town, where he told his story. He said he had been working on the surfacing gang at Arion. Friday he fell in with another workman at a saloon and they had several beers together. The new friend informed the man that there was plenty of work at Denison and that wages were better, accordingly they set out for Denison. At the place, where the holdup occurred, they sat down by the track to smoke and that is the last the victim knows of what happened. He claims to have had eighteen dollars and some lottery tickets in his inside pocket. This pocket was cut off his coat, so there is but little doubt but that robbery was the object of the cowardly attack.

**COUNCIL IS BUSY.**

Important Session Held Last Night.—Sewage, Electricity, Sidewalks and Bills.

The city council was in session until midnight last evening. The franchise and contract with the Electric Light Co. has expired and a new ordinance, much like the old one, passed to a third reading. The county entered a claim of fifteen hundred dollars for keep of prisoners, fees, etc., which was rejected by the city on the ground that commitments were made under the state law, which provides imprisonment in the county jail. This matter will perhaps come up for litigation. The school board requested that a sewer be built from the vicinity of the new high school building to the river. A committee was appointed to look after the matter and it is probable that the first of Denison's sewage system will soon be ordered. Sewage is one of the greatest needs of the city. It will enhance the value of all property and be most conducive to the good health and comfort of the community.

A sidewalk was ordered on the south side of Tremont street from Main street to the court yard. This is a greatly needed improvement. The council adjourned to meet again on Friday evening. Mr. Theo. Farak did not appear before the council, but we understand that he intends going on with his manufacturing project, although he has not decided whether he shall ask any aid from the citizens.

There is a serious difference between the county and the city which promises to be full of trouble and costs for all concerned. It is a losing game for the taxpayers whichever side is right. The question is about the use of the county jail by the city of Denison. We would remind the officers of both county and city that they are not carrying on business for themselves, that the taxpayers do not care a penny for the personal vindication of anyone's opinion, what they do care about is to have the matter adjusted with as little expense as possible. One can go to law with their private affairs and it is no one else's business but the case is different in this instance. We do not know about the legal phase of the question, but we believe as a matter of moral right that Denison should provide some place of detention for minor offenders. We would also suggest that this is the opinion of a vast majority of the people of the county and that they will be very slow to grant Denison any favors until our city shows the right spirit in regard to this matter. Our advise to both board and council is to get together with as little friction as possible, plan not to make costs in order to vindicate personal ideas, but just see how much money can be saved to the taxpayers and the people will rise up and call you blessed.

The board of supervisors are now in session although little but the routine business of providing for the payment of bills has as yet come before them. It is expected that Thursday—road day—will be a busy one although the board hopes to adjourn Thursday night.
