CHICAGO, Sept. 4.—Cattle—Receipts 17,500. An unexpectedly small run of cattle resulted in a strong market and an advance in prices of 10c for the better class; good to choice cattle sold at \$5.70@6.05, a common grade at \$4.10@5.35; stockers and feeders sold at \$3.25@4.50; bulls, cows and heifers, \$2.00@3.25; Texas hogs, \$3.30@4.30, and calves, \$4.50@7.25. Hogs—Receipts, 21,000; there was a fairly active demand for hogs at about Saturday's prices, with a few sales of prime hogs at a slight advance; heavy hogs sold at \$3.90@4.15, mixed lots at \$4.15@4.65, and light at \$4.20@4.35; pigs brought \$3.40@3.50 and culls, \$2.00@3.00. Sheep—Receipts, 5,000; sheep were in active demand at steady prices, but lambs were slow at declining prices, sheep sold at \$4.25@4.50 for prime native wethers, common grades bringing \$2.00@3.50, and western grass sheep, \$1.00@1.25; choice spring lambs brought \$5.50@6.00, ordinary grades, \$3.75@5.40.
