**COURT COMES SOON.**

Fairly Busy Session, But Little of Great Interest.

**FIVE DIVORCES WANTED.**

Manilla Occupies a Large Place on Docket. A Number of Damage Suits—Creamery Man's Troubles.

District Court convenes October 9th, with the prospect of a busy two weeks session. The docket does not show many cases of general interest as did the docket of the last session.

Among the criminal cases are those of the State vs. Butler and the State vs. L. W. Mitchell, the absconding creamery man of Manilla. There are several other actions against him and he is apt to be a central figure throughout the term. This is not all of Manilla's troubles. B. Sachra sues the town for \$3000 on account of an injury through a defective sidewalk. A Mr. Purdy asks the town to pay him \$25.00 for prospecting for water, and Mr. Bock of Manilla asks damages to the extent of \$500.00 from C. C. Norgard on a building contract deal.

The slander cases of Grace Cushing vs. Mary and Pat Hederman are again on the docket, and John Griffen asks \$5,000 damages from the county on account of a bad bridge.

The first jury trial, called for Monday, Oct. 16th, is the case of Charles Smith vs. C. & N. W. Ry. in which the company appeals from the decision of the justice's court, allowing \$24.50 for a wagon struck by the train.

The Northwestern also appeals from a decision granted M. T. Keane for being kicked from a train at Vail, and from a decision giving Dr. C. W. Carr \$99.00 for surgical services when Wm. Marr's son was accidentally injured at Arion. The Ft. Dodge and Omaha Ry. comes in for its share of attention, having appealed from the Sheriff's jury as to amount of damages in condemnation proceedings against Cashus W. Newcom, Wm. Kunze, P. Beermaker and W. A. McHenry.

The county brings action to attach some notes belonging to Fred Bucher, a man who was severely injured by the Milwaukee road near Arion, and who was cared for at county expense.

There are five applications for divorce, the largest number, we believe, ever asked for at one time before in the county. The cases are docketed as follows: J. Broadus vs. M. Broadus; Mrs. La Burke vs. R. L. La Burke; Hattie Allen vs. Sam E. Allen; Emma Boyle vs. James Boyle; Lizzie Boyles vs. M. Boyles.
