### To Republicans.

The republican convention tomorrow has an arduous task before it. The duty of a minority party is usually more easily performed than that of a majority party, but it is a part that calls for more disinterested action.

It may do for the democratic party to be governed solely by personal motives but it will not do for republicans. We believe the democratic ticket is a weak one. We do not know a single one of their candidates who has shown any particular fitness for the place he desires to fill.

The republican party is in position to benefit by all these weaknesses if its actions are controlled by wisdom and foresight. For representative we should have a man among men, a man who can meet his fellow legislators and impress them as a person of ability. We regret that democracy has not given us such a candidate. There may be many things of importance to our town and county arising during the next session and the county should have a representative who will be more than a name on the roll call. We want a man who will not calmly turn down a petition signed by 300 of his constituents as Mr. Blume did in voting for the Ray bill, we want a man who will not be carried away by every "ism" there is about.

For the important office of treasurer we want a man whom the people know and can trust. We believe the republicans have an eye on such a man and we believe he will be nominated and elected.

For attorney let us have a man who knows something about law. Mr. O'Hare is pretty but the people can tell a good deal more about his ability after he has tried his first case before the district court.

For surveyor let us have if possible a man who can survey. It might not be a bad idea.

For sheriff let us have a man who will do his duty. That might not be a bad idea either. A "good fellow" does not necessarily make a good sheriff.

For superintendent let us have a man who has had experience in the management of teachers and who can upon occasion tell that 2 and 2 make 4 without using a slate pencil.

For supervisors let us have good representative men, so located that they can be conveniently reached by their constituents. A man from the northwest and a man from the east end would fill the bill. Let us get some one who has business enough about him to know a treasurer's balance sheet from a foot ball game. The county certainly has enough business so that it can afford to have at least one or two practical business men on the board. By this we do not mean that the candidates should not be farmers, for some of our farmers are among our very best business men.

For coroner let us have a man who is humane, who, knows what decency is, and who will show at least as much respect for the dead as does the Indian or the Hottentot.

The opportunity is before the republicans of the county, the democrats have nominated the poorest ticket ever presented to the people of this county. Let republicans be wise and strong and victory is theirs.

The recent democratic convention was worth two hundred votes to the republican party. If democracy could only have a few more conventions every republican candidate would be elected.

### COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The city council met last evening in regular session Mayor Kemming presiding. All members were present. Although the meeting had been called for 7:00 o'clock sharp it was 11 o'clock before an adjournment was had.

The business of the evening was taken up with a petition signed by a number of property owners on Mathewson street asking for a street light in that part of town, which was referred to a committee of three who are to report at next meeting.

The president of the state board of health, Dr. J. I. Gibson, came before the council and spoke in regard to the necessity of the board of health issuing burial permits in all cases. This subject was referred to the board of health.

The city treasurer read his report of the finances for the month of September. A permit was granted the school board to use such streets and alleys for the use of sewer as far as city jurisdiction, provided an outlet into the river is secured. A two-inch water pipe was ordered laid on the north side of east Tremont street ending near Mr. Wiggins' property. It was also ordered that the city surveyor locate grade on Wall street and that a sidewalk be made to enable property owners to lay a sidewalk.

The city weighmaster reported \$21.90 as collected for the month of September. During the past month the scales have undergone much needed repairs and are now in first-class condition.

An ordinance was introduced and numbered 149, said ordinance was for the establishment of a grade on west Broadway connecting with the new road leading into Denison. This ordinance provides for the making of a fine street and will undoubtedly be passed. A committee was appointed to confer with board of supervisors and get contract to build bridge.

Immediately after the adjournment of the council the board of health met and considerable time was devoted to the discussion of the state board of health rules. For the benefit of the general public we publish a portion of Ordinance No. 80, and trust the public will adhere to the same as it is very important. The attention of all city physicians, the coroner and undertakers is called to this ordinance and it is hoped they will adhere strictly to its provisions.

### ORDINANCE NO. 80.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE REMOVAL OF DECEASED PERSONS.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Incorporated town of Denison, Iowa:

SECTION 1. That upon the death of any human being in the incorporated town of Denison, it shall be the duty of the physician who attended during his or her last sickness, or the coroner when the case comes under his notice, to furnish, within twenty-four hours after such death, a certificate to the undertaker or other person superintending the burial of said deceased, setting forth the full name, age, sex, color, place of death, date and cause of death, and such other facts as are required by chapter 161, section 6 laws of 1880, and forms prepared by the State Board of Health. If any person shall die without the attendance of a physician, or if the physician who did attend the decedent at the time of death shall refuse or neglect to give such certificate as aforesaid, he shall be the duty of the undertaker or any other person acquainted with the facts, to report the same to the health officer, who is hereby authorized to give a certificate of death as aforesaid, if he does not receive such certificate from the coroner.

SECTION 2. No sexton or other person having charge of any cemetery, vault, or burying place of tomb within the town of Denison, or under control of said town, and no undertaker shall inter, entomb, or place in a vault the body of any person within the town of Denison, or remove the dead body of any person from or out of the town of Denison without having procured said certificate of death; and it shall be the further duty of any undertaker or other person within the town of Denison having charge of the burial or the removal of the dead body of any person, to return said certificate forthwith to the recorder of said town.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the recorder upon the presentation of such certificate of death, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, to issue a certificate of permission to entomb or remove the body of the deceased person named in said certificate, and the recorder shall receive for issuing such permit a fee of 25 cents.

## THREE DAYS FIGHTING

### Insurgents Attack American Lines From Imus to Bacoor.

### KILL TWO AND WOUND EIGHT.

Fourth Infantry Under Major Price Does the Fighting—Requests Admiral Watson to Send Two Gunboats to His Assistance—Filipino Colonel Killed.

MANILA, Oct. 3.—The Filipino envoys called on Major General Otis yesterday and discussed matters, with no result. General Alejandro said to a representative of the Associated Press that he had no instructions except to deliver a letter, which was rejected. He will return to Tarlac today.

An expedition composed of an armored flatboat, armed with two 3-pounders, and the gunboats Helena, Petrel and Mindoro escorting it, proceeded yesterday to Oreni for the purpose of bombarding that place, landing 200 marines and bluejackets, and raising the wrecked gunboat Urdaneta. The gunboats will approach to about 2,700 yards from Oreni and the flatboat will enter the river.

The insurgents attacked Imus on the Bacoor road today. The last advice from there were that the Americans had driven off the enemy, with five casualties. The insurgents' loss was estimated to be large.

#### Hot Fighting at Imus.

The Fourth infantry, Major Price commanding, has had a series of encounters with the insurgents about Imus since Saturday. The natives were led, it is supposed, by a former mayor of Imus and made a general attack upon the American lines from Imus to Bacoor. A captain and a corporal of the American forces were killed and eight men were wounded. A Filipino colonel is known to have been killed. Major Price requested Admiral Watson to send two gunboats to his support. The fighting began on Saturday, when Captain Brown took the same battalion that distinguished itself at Perez Das Marinas and Lieutenant Knabenshue's scouts against a large force of insurgents on the Perez Das Marinas road and a general engagement followed. The soldiers lying in the ricefields kept up a fire for an hour and a half, when reinforcements were sent them. The insurgents retreated. The fighting yesterday began with an attack by the insurgents on a party repairing the telegraph line, one member of which was wounded.

#### McKinley's Trip Across Iowa.

DUBUQUE, Oct. 3.—President McKinley's trip across Iowa will be over the Illinois Central from Sioux City to Dubuque. Returning his special train will leave Sioux City at 10:45 p. m., Oct. 15. He will make five-minute stops at LeMars, Cherokee, Fort Dodge, Webster City, Iowa Falls, Parkersburg, Cedar Falls, Independence, Manchester and ten minutes at Waterloo. The train will reach Dubuque at 10:45 a. m., Monday, Oct. 16.

#### Pats Blame on Agent Preston.

OSKALOOSA, Ia., Oct. 3.—The coroner's inquest held yesterday at Wright to investigate the head-end collision and killing of four trainmen on the Chicago and Northwestern railway, Sept. 26, resulted in a verdict of the jury blaming A. A. Preston, agent and operator at Wright, for giving wrong orders to the passenger train. The evidence tended to exonerate the train dispatcher at Belle Plaine, whence the orders were issued.
