The Platform.

Resolutions were read and adopted approving the administration of President McKinley and the governor of the state as follows: We commend the action of the Iowa delegation in congress in its support of protection and of the Dingley tariff, of the maintenance of the gold standard and in its faithful support of the administration of President McKinley in his policy in peace and war. We rejoice in the prospective election of David B. Henderson to be speaker of the house of representatives and endorse him as wholly worthy of that honor. We reiterate the following declaration from the Iowa republican platform of 1898: "The monetary standard of this country and the commercial world is gold. The permanence of this standard must be assured by congressional legislation, giving to it validity and vitality of public law. All other money must be kept at a parity of gold. "And we urgently call upon our senators and representatives in congress to lend their best endeavors to enact these propositions into law." We denounce the Chicago platform and its declaration in favor of free trade and free silver coinage at the ratio of 16 to 1 and its attacks upon the courts, as threatening the American people with a departure from the policies of good government that would prove fraught with evil to the American people. The enemies of that platform call for the rescission of all gold policies. As republicans we make recognition of the loyalty and exalted patriotism of the sound money democrats and men of all parties who put aside party prejudice in order to maintain the good faith of the nation and in the resistance to the Chicago platform and candidate, to maintain the welfare of the people. The object of all good government industry and commerce should be left free to pursue their method according to the natural laws of the world, but when business aggregations known as trusts prove hurtful to the people they must be restrained by natural laws and if need be abolished. We believe in the wisdom and high purpose of the president. We admire the skill and courage of our officers and glory in the valor, constancy and hereditary heroism of our soldier boys of the army and navy. Nothing of support or sympathy or more or put aside and comfort will be ever withheld from them. There shall be no divisions among us until all in arms against the flag shall confess the supreme rights and honor, and shall know that even in the far east it is a sign of promise of equal laws, of justice, and liberty throughout the land and to all the inhabitants thereof. That for national defense, for reinforcement of the navy, for enlargement of our foreign markets, for the employment of American workmen, in mines, forests, farms, mills, factories and ship yards, we favor the enactment of legislation which will regulate for American ships the carrying of our foreign commerce.

IOWA VETERINARIAN.

Synopsis of the Report of Dr. J. I. Gibson. WORK OF DEPARTMENT. Careful Resume of Work Done and Results Accomplished.—Of Interest to Farmers. Below we quote a synopsis of the Bi-Annual Report of the State Veterinary Surgeon, Dr. J. I. Gibson, of Denison, as published in the Iowa State Register. Dr. Gibson has proven himself a faithful and efficient official. Throughout the state he has become one of its popular officers. His work merits the approval of all who are interested not only in cattle raising, but in improved conditions of human life. Below we publish an excellent portrait of Dr. Gibson, a man of whose record all Denison is proud. State Veterinarian Gibson filed his biennial report with Governor Shaw on Wednesday. In it he says that owners of Iowa stock have discovered that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and the demands on the time and resources of the veterinarian department exceed the possibilities under the \$5,000 appropriation. He thinks the bureau should be given at least \$10,000. It is the work of prevention to which the department gives most of its attention, because that is the public demand now. It is possible by vaccination to produce immunity to a number of the heretofore most fatal contagious and infectious diseases of animals, and scientists are at work with other vaccines which will doubtless prove as effective as those now made use of to the entire satisfaction of the live stock owners of the state.

THE DISEASES.

In the period covered by the report, the department has been called upon to investigate outbreaks of the following named diseases, to wit: Anthrax, actinomycosis, abortion (contagious) in cows and ewes, black leg catarrhal conjunctivitis, or specific ophthalmia,

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

The discovery of the first immunizing vaccines was semi-accidental, but from a knowledge of these the scientists of today can take the virus of any transmissible disease, isolate the germ, study and learn its nature, and then proceed to produce a vaccine or inoculative serum which produces an immunity in some degree. To produce absolute immunity, it would be necessary to remove conditions which favor the progress of the disease, as well as to vaccinate the animal which furnishes the favored soil for the culmination of the germ life, which is the disease. This is especially true in connection with the serum therapy in hog cholera. The use of the serum with anti cholera conditions of the premises will prove quite satisfactory, but the use of anti-cholera serum together with pro-cholera conditions of the premises will not prove satisfactory. Conceding these facts, the time has come when we can vaccinate the animal with the immunizing vaccine and as a vaccine for the conditions and premises enact and enforce wholesome sanitary laws and preventive restrictions. This theory believed in and carried out, not only by sanitarians and health authorities, but by our entire citizen ship, will make Iowa a health resort, and the dread of many of the most virulent diseases will be felt no more. The recent outbreaks of small pox in Iowa furnishes a sample of what may be accomplished through vaccination and sanitary laws. In this outbreak there were 249 cases with only two deaths. In former years the death rate was 25 per cent in such outbreaks. In the past, there were latent cases of glanders and tuberculosis which could not be detected by the most skillful veterinarian and which were a constant source of renewed outbreaks of those diseases, but which now can be diagnosed to a certainty by any veterinarian with the aid of the mallein and tuberculin test. An outbreak of glanders now does not necessarily mean repeated subsequent outbreaks, for by testing all exposed animals with mallein and destroying all that react, indicating the presence of the disease and thoroughly cleansing and disinfecting the premises and utensils that may have become infected with the virus, no further cases may be expected as a result of the original outbreak. Until recently there was little hope of eradicating tuberculosis from an individual herd, but with the tuberculin test applied to a herd, and all that react destroyed, and none but tested individuals added to the herd, together with disinfection and proper sanitary conditions of premises, a herd of cattle may be kept free from this dreaded disease, which causes a great loss to cattle owners and untold human misery. That "the world is growing better" in sanitation is an evident fact, known to all who study the question of the "public death," which is conceded by all great men to be the most important question a state or nation is called upon to solve. The improved sanitary conditions in Iowa are not all the result of the earnest effort on the part of the few official sanitarians, but largely the result of the physicians, veterinarians and municipal officer's daily instructions and admonitions to the people of their several localities. When the individual citizen demands sanitary cleanliness, then, and not until then, may we hope for general cleanliness and health in Iowa.
