CEMETERY IS BURNED

Lutheran Cemetery Scoured by Prairie Fire.

MONUMENTS ARE RUINED

Careless Boys Start a Fire Which Sweeps over Cemetery.—Oakland Cemetery Narrowly Escapes.

On Sunday afternoon shortly after the funeral of Mrs. August Lange, some boys were seen running for dear life from a field south of the cemetery toward town. Back of them was a cloud of smoke which told the story of a prairie fire, so much dreaded at this time of the year. Mr. Plimpton was still at Oakland cemetery. Mr. Woolston was notified and came with a team and plow. For a time it seemed that the blaze might sweep through to the river. About a score of men fought the flames, but it was too late to prevent the destruction of the Lutheran cemetery. The fences are burned and many expensive monuments erected by loving hearts in memory of their dead, are blackened and destroyed. The loss in this line will amount to a large sum. Oakland cemetery was saved only by extreme effort. The beautiful grove of oaks, which Mr. Plimpton has preserved for a park, was probably killed, but by means of plowing and by back fires the cemetery property was saved. The thanks of the community are due to those, whose efforts saved our city of the dead from destruction.
