NEW TIME TABLE.

There was a new time card went into effect on the Northwestern Sunday. Nos. 17 and 18 will hereafter run between Boone and Council Bluffs and make all stops; No. 17 goes west at 7:15 a. m. and No. 18 goes east at 6:30 instead of 8:13. No. 6, goes east at 7:14 and stops only for Chicago passengers, No. 2 goes east at 9:52, No. 4 at 8:57 a. m. No. 5 goes at 9:18 instead of 9:23 and No. 1 at 5:54 instead of 6:04, Nos. 3 and 8 remain at the old schedule. These changes are now in effect and the traveling public should govern themselves accordingly.

Two changes have also been made in the Milwaukee time card at Arion. The morning passenger train north leaves at 6:32 instead of 6:45, and the passenger south at night leaves at 9:10 instead of 7:15.

The new line, the Boyer Valley goes north at 6 p. m. instead of 6:30, on the Milwaukee No. 4 goes east 9:10 p. m., No. at 6:32 a. m.

DEATH OF BENJAMIN DAWSON.

The following account of the death of Mr. J. B. Dawson's father is taken from the Clarke City, Mo., correspondence to the Keokuk Gate City.

At 8:45 o'clock Wednesday morning, October 4th, Benjamin Dawson, postmaster at this place, died of cardiac asthma at the family residence. He was born in Meltham, Yorkshire, England, April 8, 1831. In 1851 he married Ruth Eastwood of the same place. Of this marriage five children survive, J. B. of Deloit, Iowa; Mrs. T. Nelson, Arlem, Mo.; K. W., of Oklahoma City; A. T., of South McAlester, and Mrs. Chas. Spangler of this place. He immigrated to America in 1852, and settled in New Hampshire. He went to Clay county, Mo., in 1886 and came to Clarke county in 1870. His wife died in Liberty April 3, 1870. On August 10, 1890, he married Lizzie Hobbs of Clarke City, who survives with three children, Leah, Ono and Rockley. In early life he joined the Established church of England. The funeral services were held at the M. E. church Friday morning at 10 o'clock by Rev. W. F. Burris, with interment in Kahoka cemetery. His life was one of hard labor, honesty, integrity and devotion to his family.
