FINE SCHOOL EXHIBIT

Most Successful Showing Ever Made by Our Schools.
TWO FINE PROGRAMS.
Musical Features Were Rare Treats—Splendid Philippine Exhibit—List of Prize Winners.
The exhibit given on Friday and Saturday by the schools of Crawford county was a success in every particular. Contributions of work came from many schools outside of Denison showing that the interest in this annual exhibit is becoming more and more general. The Manila teachers were given a holiday on Friday and they came over in a body. The schools of West Side, Dow City and Manila have promised more extended exhibits for next year. The exhibits consisted of work in arithmetic, language, penmanship, map drawing, orations, essays, herbariums, bookkeeping, industrial work for boys and girls, which was made a special feature, kindergarten and many other exhibits. The work of the pupils showed a great deal of ability and reflected credit upon the schools of Denison and of the county. The exhibits were entered by numbers and were carefully and impartially judged. Supt. Hersom of Manila judged all exhibits save those of the grammar grade which were passed upon by Prof. Ross Masters. Mrs. R. A. Romans and Mrs. W. J. Scriver judged the girl's industrial work. The list of the prize winners is given below.
Aside from these school exhibits there were industrial displays by a number of Denison merchants, Orkin Bros. had a handsome display in the gallery, as did Mr. Theo. Farak of his upholstering goods. On the ground floor were fine art exhibits by Mrs. J. L. Ainsworth and Mrs. M. E. Wahl. These paintings were of high order and showed real artistic merit. Among the other displays were those of O. M. Campbell, J. L. Warbasse, Haugh & Kemming and Drybread & Co. and "The Boys"; these displays were of more than ordinary merit, that of "The Boys" being especially artistic.
Friday evening was devoted to the graded schools, and the work done was a surprise to all. The singing was fine and fully justified the wisdom of introducing the study of music into our schools. The declamations were not delivered in the sing song way but with a real understanding of the subject. Johnnie Rippen with his whistle and drum was perhaps the star of the evening. The program has been published in full in former issues.
Saturday evening there was given a sacred cantata "The Seasons" under the direction of Prof. F. W. Eastman. The chorus of sixty voices did splendidly especially toward the climax which was sung with a vigor and precision worthy of professionals. The solos by Mrs. J. N. Bradley and Prof. Eastman, their duets and a trio in which Mrs. C. J. Voss joined were fine and the audience waxed enthusiastic over the great work of the Denison artists. The evening was a distinct triumph for Prof. Eastman and his work in the schools.
After the programs the pretty high school girls served coffee and a light lunch, the proceeds being loyally devoted to helping the foot ball team out of debt. This is not the first time in history that the ladies have rescued the sterner sex from financial disaster and the high school girls have made a good start. The proceeds were more than sufficient for the purpose in this instance. The crowded houses which greeted each evening's program testified to what a deep interest our people take in the public schools and their welfare and as long as this interest continues there is no danger of retrogression.
The most interesting features of the exhibit were the Philippine collections loaned by Prof. J. R. Barge and W. C. Cramer. These collections gathered by the boys while fighting for Uncle Sam included a wide range of subjects, United States and Philippine side arms, cartridges and bullets, beautiful shells, samples of the flora of the country, photographs from Manila and Japan, dainty bits of handicraft, shawls, fans and a hundred other curios of novelty to Americans. The management is very grateful to the boys for their valuable contribution to the interest of the exposition. Financially the affair was as successful as it was from every other standpoint.

Ordinance No. 151.
AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE TRANSCIENT MERCHANTS.
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa:
SECTION 1.—Any transient merchant selling, or in any manner offering for sale any goods, wares or merchandise within the City of Denison, Iowa, at auction or private sale, shall pay one hundred dollars per month (\$100.00) per month as a license therefor, or ten dollars (\$10.00) per day if such license is issued for a shorter period.
SECTION 2.—Any transient merchant selling either at public auction or private sale, whether holding auctioneer's license or not, shall be deemed a transient merchant.
SECTION 3.—Any person required by this ordinance to procure a license and failing to do so shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars (\$5.00), nor more than One Hundred dollars (\$100.00) and costs, any person continuing business under an expired license shall pay a like fine and costs, and all persons so convicted and fined shall be imprisoned until such fine and costs are paid or until discharged by due course of law.
SECTION 4.—All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
SECTION 5.—This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after being published in the Denison Review and Denison Bulletin.
