**FIRST REGULAR TRAIN.**

Illinois Central Puts on its First Train From Fort Dodge to Dunlap.

The Illinois Central put on its first regular train to-day between Fort Dodge and Dunlap. It is an accommodation train running on what may be called a provisional schedule and subject to change at any time. The train leaves Dunlap at 1:30 a. m., passes through Denison at 3:30 a. m. and reaches Fort Dodge at 9:45 a. m. Going west the train leaves Fort Dodge in the forenoon passes Denison at 12:55 and reaches Dunlap at 2:30 p. m. The service as at present arranged will not be of much use to Denison people but this is no criterion of what the service will be when the road is turned over to the operating department and through trains put on.

**COUNCIL MEETS.**

Grants Permit for Another Saloon on Lot 13, Block 72.

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held last evening, all members being present except Mr. Luney, who is up in North Dakota.

A petition was presented to the council signed by P. T. Flinn asking for a permit to own and operate a saloon on lot 13, block 72. This is in the northwest corner of the Fargo House, next to the alley. After considerable discussion the permit was granted. Mr. Flinn hails from Odebolt, where he conducts a similar business. He is well spoken of as a man of business principles.

A petition, signed by fifty-one citizens, asking that the grade at the intersection of Washington Avenue and Broadway remain as at present established, was also presented and read.

The ordinance in relation to the Odebolt Telephone Co. was passed to its second reading. It was decided to notify this company that a special election would be held on January 9, 1900, to ascertain whether or no the citizens desired their coming, said company to pay expense of such election.

After allowing a few bills of minor importance council adjourned.

**ALL NIGHT SERVICE.**

This means an all night service for Denison after January first.
