OBITUARY.

Ethan Allen McKim was born in Berks county, Pennsylvania, October 27, 1824, and died at his home in Deloit, Crawford county, Iowa, January 1, 1900, at 5 a. m. He was a twin brother of Esau McKim, also of Deloit, and besides these there were six other brothers and one sister. Six of the brothers, Martin, David, Esau and Ethan, John and William named in the order of their ages respectively, have resided in this county many years; Martin dying in Denison in 1884, and John and William having removed elsewhere some years ago. Being left orphans early in life the family had to shift for itself, but the thrift of all is now manifest in the comfortable circumstances of each member. Ethan had poor health as a lad and later in life was compelled to abandon his chosen trade, that of cabinet-maker, and follow carpentry as the best remedy for chronic dyspepsia.

In April 1850, in York county, Pa., he married Elizabeth McCollam, 8 years his junior, and still surviving him. He greatly desired to live out fifty years of married life and celebrate the golden wedding the coming spring. This pleasure was denied him. Out of the seven children born to him five are still living and all were present to minister to his last wants. Mrs. Mary E. Tucker, the eldest, came from Kearney, Neb., Mrs. Sarah M. Newcom, from Odebolt, Iowa, James, residing near Deloit, on the old home farm, John R. and G. Eugene from Pittsburg, Kansas. All the children are married and a dozen of grand children now gladden the various homes. Notwithstanding some discouragements in health no one ever tolled more faithfully or persistently to provide for his family and honor his obligations than did he. With the help of a faithful, loving, christian wife his work was successful and his sterling character has left an example worthy of emulation. Puritanically orthodox and abruptly plain in speech he had a warm side for all who knew him well and did many acts of Christian benevolence. Moving to Iowa in '61 and living continuously since then in the same block in Deloit, his familiar presence will be much missed by hundreds who knew him tenderly as "Uncle Ethan."
