

SEEN FOR MILES.

The Great Review Kite Soars Majestically Above the Beautiful City of Denison—Great Crowds Watch It.

On Wednesday afternoon the beautiful large kite belonging to this office was flown for the first time. It was started from the hill near the court house and quickly raised to a height of over eight hundred feet. Large crowds of people quickly gathered on the streets to watch this novel machine, the inventor of which is Mr. Silas Conyne of Chicago. The kite itself is ten feet long and beautifully painted in red, white and blue colors. About two hundred feet below the kite hung a beautiful white silk banner with these words:
