FARMERS' INSTITUTE NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

Denison Prepares to Welcome the Agriculturalists. Work of Preparation Being Rapidly Pushed.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED. SCHOOL BEGINS MONDAY

Will Proceed at Once to Arrange for Denison's Share. Every One is Invited for February 2nd and 3rd. High School Will Occupy Old Building For the Present, Kindergarten Goes to New Building. The new high school building, the crowning glory of Denison's public school system, will be occupied next Monday. On the first floor are four good sized school rooms, several recitation rooms and offices, and the western side of the building is devoted to the large high school room. This is 40x60 in dimensions and is two stories high. There is a raised platform in the north end of the room and every appointment is perfect. On the second floor are four school rooms and a number of recitation rooms for high school students. In the basement is the great heating plant and the big ventilating fan operated by an engine which stands near by. The north end of the basement is occupied by coal and other supplies. In a sunny bright room in the southeast corner is the kindergarten room. Underneath the high school room is a large gymnasium which should be speedily fitted up. Modern toilet arrangements are located in the southwest corner of the basement. Just at present a large force is at work putting up seats and getting everything in readiness. The schools which will move into the new building next week are those formerly occupying the White school house, the Grammar school which has been in the City Hall and the Kindergarten. All other pupils will remain in their old quarters for the present. The new building is a beauty inside and out and is fully worth the money it cost to erect it. The building is well finished, the views from the windows are fine, and the whole building has an air of light and cheerfulness that makes one long for his school days once again. It will indeed be proper that this building should be publicly dedicated to the use of our schools and the board and superintendent who have worked so faithfully to bring about its accomplishment should long be remembered by a grateful people.

EIGHT TRAINS EACH WAY.

The train service between Denison and Omaha will hereafter be almost equal to a street car line connecting the two cities. Eight trains a day each way ought to afford sufficient service for all patrons. Four trains now run on the Northwestern and next week the Illinois Central's service will be increased to four trains each way every day except Sunday. The distance to Council Bluffs over the Central is a trifle shorter than via the Northwestern but not enough to make any real difference. According to our latest information relative to the Central's new time card the trains will run as follows: A fast train running through to St. Paul in the morning, a local passenger at about the same time as the one now running, a through fast train to Chicago and St. Paul in the evening and a local passenger just preceding this fast train, make up the east and north bound schedule. Going west and south, the Chicago through train will arrive here in the morning, preceded by a local passenger, a local passenger will arrive at present about 5:30 p. m. and the fast train from St. Paul will arrive in the evening. One can thus go to Omaha at 5:54 a. m., 7:15 a. m., 1:20 p. m. and 9:18 p. m. on the Northwestern as well as on the new Central's trains. If Denison only had good local service east on the Northwestern the train service would be unequalled.
