**TRAMPS COAX BOYS TO TRAMP.**

Two Iowa Youngsters. Induced to Come to Big City, Now Want to go Home.

Omaha World-Herald: Two lads, who ran away from their home near Deloit, Ia., Tuesday afternoon, were turned over to the police yesterday by the employes at the Harney street power house. They told the police they were sorry they had run away, and now wished they were back on the farm once more.

Frank and James Brown are 12 and 10 years of age, respectively. They are both bright little chaps, but admitted that they had no idea of what they were going to do after getting the city. Frank said that home had grown to be disagreeable because his stepmother talked about him to the neighbors, and said that he was a bad boy. Tuesday afternoon, accompanied by his little brother, he went to Deloit. While there they fell in with two tramps, who invited them to come to Omaha.

"We haven't any money and can't go," said Frank.

"Oh, that's all right," said one of the tramps, "we always travel without money and we'll show you now."

Frank and James accepted the alluring invitation. They tramped ten miles to Denison, and waited there until it was very dark. They were somewhat frightened at first by what they had done, and by the two strange men, but after a bit they recovered their customary lightheartedness, for the vagrants seemed a genial pair, and were glowing in their descriptions of the wonders of the city. At 9 o'clock the Colorado special, the fast Northwestern limited, arrived at Denison from the east. The tramps placed the boys on the rear platform of the train and then climbed on themselves. It was a bright, pleasant ride, and the boys enjoyed it very much. They laughed and joked with the tramps and were quite happy.

At 11:20 the Colorado special arrived in Omaha. The party left the train and mounted the steps to the Tenth street viaduct. The boys were astonished at all they saw and when they were on the viaduct they insisted on looking through the railing at the trains rushing to and fro beneath. When they turned to seek their companions they found the tramps had vanished. Then the boys were very much scared and began to realize where they were. They walked about the town all night, and at 2 a. m. saw a light streaming from the doorway of the power house. They entered the building and told their story to the employes who put them to bed in a car.

The police wired the chief of police of Denison, and requested him to inform Wim Brown, the father of the boys, that they are here, but eager to return home.
