Denison might learn a good lesson from the British public if it would. At the beginning of the war in South Africa the English thought it was to be a picnic campaign. They felt sure that when the Boers caught sight of "Tommy Atkins" and his bright red coat they would throw up their hands in immediate surrender.

It is but a week since Denison began its campaign for the location of a state normal. The people who expected the committee to go to Des Moines and return the next day with the normal neatly done up in tissue paper and tied with pink ribbons, have been disappointed.

One result thus far attained is the dropping of several of the smaller towns, which were at first applicants. This weeding out process will continue until only the best locations and the best propositions remain.

The English have met with a severe reverse in South Africa as is shown by the dispatches elsewhere. The question of our sympathies with either the British or the Boers is one which the United States as a nation, has no business to deal.

LOCATION THE ISSUE

The Iowa Normal School Bill May Pass.

INDUCEMENTS OFFERED.

Numerous Cities, Governor Shaw's Home Town, Denison, Among Others, in The Field.

DES MOINES, Jan. 28.—The bill for location of additional normal schools introduced in the legislature—in the senate by Senator Hazleton and in the house by Mr. Byers of Shelby—is creating widespread interest throughout Iowa.

The bill is a result of a suggestion contained in Governor Shaw's recent message. For a number of years there has been a feeling throughout the state that additional normal facilities were necessary, the one school at Cedar Falls being badly overcrowded.

There seems at present to be no question as to the desirability of the additional schools, the only controversy being as to where they shall be located and as to how many there shall be established.

Upon the convening of the legislature it was found that there would be at least thirty candidates for the locations and this fact had at first a tendency to dismay the members and threatened the abandonment of the work.

Among the remaining applicants may be mentioned Fairfield, Albia, Wapello, Knoxville, Newton and Creston in the south and east parts of the state, Spencer, Algona, Emmetsburg, LeMars and Storm Lake in the northwestern part of the state, and Red Oak, Atlantic, Harlan and Denison in the southwestern portion.

The bill, as now pending, provides for the location of three schools, the location to be selected by a joint ballot of the legislature, and providing that any town may be an applicant which will offer to the state not less than forty nor more than sixty acres of land, located within a limit of not less than one-fourth of a mile nor more than two miles from the business center of the city.

Notwithstanding the fact that a caucus held by a few members gave expression to the desire that the citizens of the various towns should not present their claims in person, the past week has seen Des Moines flooded with prominent citizens from different portions of the state advocating the claims of their home towns.

OFFER BY DENISON CITIZENS. Among the many towns represented by a delegation of citizens is Denison the home of Governor Shaw.

The Denison people have a strong case and have succeeded in bringing it before the legislature in a favorable light. Their proposition consists in the formal tender to the state of a well-equipped, successful normal school, now in operation.

The initial run of the Illinois Central's fast Chicago-Omaha trains was made yesterday morning, the train passing through Denison about eight o'clock. Through the courtesy of Capt. J. F. Merry, assistant general passenger agent of the Illinois Central railroad, about sixty-five newspaper men from northern and western Iowa were given an excursion on this train from Dubuque to Omaha and return.

The train was made up of seven, bright, new coaches, pulled by engine No. 927, and was in charge of Conductor O'Hara and Engineer Mullen.

The car next the engine was a combined baggage, buffet library car, and is the finest of its kind ever built. It is seated with beautiful, high backed, cane chairs, and has every luxury that a person could desire. The library contains books by all the favorite authors, the latest magazines, etc.

Several officials of the road besides the newspaper men, accompanied the train yesterday on its first trip. At the new Broadway depot in Council Bluffs they were met by the mayor, city officials, a committee representing the professional and business men of the city, and a delegation of Omaha citizens.

The party was then shown to the cars again and taken through the implement district of Council Bluffs, going across the river to Omaha shortly after noon. Here they were met by a committee from the Omaha Commercial Club and were taken to South Omaha where they visited the packing house plants of both the Swift and Armour Companies, and also the Union Stock Yards.
