

KILLED BY THE CARS

Fred Boos Caught on Track by the Illinois Central Train.

HIS HOME IN MICHIGAN.

Sad Accident Occurs on Friday Evening. The Remains Brought to Denison. A Brother Arrives.

Friday evening as the Illinois Central train No. 33 was running at a high rate of speed between Wall Lake and Brogan it struck a man lying between the rails on the track and almost instantly killed him. The train was over an hour late and was running 40 miles an hour. Engineer Ruben saw an object on the track when about 800 feet away and on coming nearer found it to be the form of a man. He instantly applied the air brakes, but could not stop the train before the pilot struck the man, hurling him down the bank at the side. He was picked up and placed on the train but never regained consciousness, and died before reaching Denison. A leather grip was found beside the body, and \$7.98 in his pockets, a watch, a ring, etc.

The body was taken to C. J. Salomon's undertaking rooms to await the result of the investigation by the coroner's jury. Coroner Smith empaneled a jury Saturday morning, and met in the new Central depot. Attorney Conner assisted in the inquest and the train crew were called upon to testify. No additional evidence could be secured and the jury adjourned to meet again Monday night.

Yesterday, however, it was learned the man's name was Fred Boos, and that he had been working on the section at Brogan for Foreman O'Keefe. Boos had gone to Wall Lake in the morning and had started to walk back with a man by the name of Cummings, who left him under a bridge. This was the last seen of him alive.

The verdict of the jury was that deceased came to his death by being struck by a passenger train, and exonerates the company from all blame.

A. G. Boos, a brother of the dead man, arrived from Jackson, Mich., this morning and will take the body back there for burial. The man has three brothers, four sisters and a mother to mourn his untimely death.

ORATORICAL CONTEST!

The Event of the School Year. Glee Clubs Score a Hit.

The 2nd Annual Denison H. S. Contest last evening was a splendid success in every particular. The essays were exceptional in both thought and composition; the orations were well written and magnificently delivered; the declamations seldom equaled by students of the same age; and the music, especially the two Glee Clubs was simply fine. The entire program was a surprise to many, and Denison may well be proud not only of her H. S. Building, but the H. S. itself, which is doing better work in every line than ever before in its history.

The program opened with a pleasing duet by Alfie Sewell and Florence Kirkup, followed by the three essays by Mary Walker, Willetta Strahn and Merle Smith. The Girls' Glee Club was enthusiastically received by the audience and responded to an encore. The orations by Geo. Morris, Horace Gregory and Herald Romans followed, after which the Boys' Glee Club made its appearance. Every body was proud of their fine effort. They sang like veterans, and were compelled to respond twice to encores. The Declamatory class probably received more attention than any other, because the winner was to represent Denison at the Northern Iowa contest to be held at Anamosa, March 30, 1900. The declamations were easily equal to any amateur effort ever heard in Denison, and the judges had great difficulty in making a decision, the three tying in rank for first place. The per cents however gave first place to Chas. Gable and second to Fred Soehl, there being but one per cent difference between the two speakers.

Geo. Morris won first place in the oration class, and Horace Gregory captured second place. Herald Romans however won a first place in delivery. Merle Smith won first place in the essay class and Willetta Strahn second place. Gold and silver medals were awarded for first and second places respectively. The judges on delivery were, Rev. Clyde, of Dunlap, Supt. P. E. Hersem, of Manilla and Prof. Van Ness.
