WOODCRAFT'S SOLDIERS

Furnished More Volunteers Than Any Other Society During the Spanish-American War.

The Maccabees furnished nearly 1,000 soldiers for the Spanish war. What other order can show the same record?—California Insurance Review.

Members of the society, Modern Woodmen of America, to the number of 1,638 were in the American volunteer service during the war with Spain. They came from Camps of the Society in seventeen states, Illinois leading with 312 Woodman soldiers. In addition it may be noted this Society paid all death claims of Woodman soldiers, over \$100,000 being disbursed in this way. It was the first society in the country that did this, compelling all others to follow its patriotic lead.

The Modern Woodman Deputies, of whom there are over 1,100 in the Woodman jurisdiction, have organized a National Deputies' Association. C. J. Byrns, of Ishpeming, Mich., is president; John F. Harris, of Oakland, Cal., vice-president; W. H. Wycoff, of Newcastle, Pa., secretary, and E. P. Young, of Portland, Maine, treasurer.

K. P.'s GIVE SMOKER.
