IOWA HAPPENINGS.

Matthiesen Hooked by a Boar. RUTHVEN, Ia., Feb. 6.—G. H. Matthiesen was hooked in one of his legs by a mad boar while reeading cattle yesterday. The tusk cut into the bone. He is in a dangerous condition.

Price of Steel is Too High. DES MOINES, Feb. 7.—President Polk says the interurban line to the southwest would not be constructed this year. He thinks steel is too high and that the cost of construction will be double what it was two years ago.

Fort Dodge and Southeastern Line. FORT DODGE, Ia., Feb. 6.—The Fort Dodge and Southeastern railway has been organized by local capitalists, with \$250,000 capital. It will build 40 miles of road, to connect this city with the Iowa Central at Storey, or with the Chicago and Northwestern at Boone.

Goodrich Cleared of Murder Charge. SIOUX CITY, Feb. 7.—Oscar E. Goodrich, charged with the murder of his former partner, John E. Robson, was completely cleared of the charge at the preliminary trial yesterday. The case was dismissed, owing to a lack of evidence, on motion of the county attorney.

Hagerman Murder Trial Begun. DES MOINES, Feb. 8.—J. D. Hagerman, a prominent liquor dealer, was placed on trial in the district court, charged with the murder of Frank Moody. The case promises to consume a great deal of time and will now go to the jury before the latter part of the week.

Sister Mary Goussage Promoted. DUBUQUE, Feb. 7.—Sister Mary Goussage of Davenport arrived here from that city to take the position of assistant mother superior of the entire order of Sisters of Charity of the United States. For 27 years past she had been with the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception at Davenport.

New Line to Coal Fields. DAVENPORT, Feb. 6.—The annual meeting of the Davenport, Rock Island and Northwestern Railway company was held here yesterday. It was decided to build a line from here to Peoria this year through 8,000 acres of coal lands the company has purchased. The officers elected were: President, John W. Gates; vice president, John Lambert, secretary and treasurer, Charles G. Gates.

Church Choir on Strike. CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Feb. 8.—This city is the scene of a novel strike, the magnificent vestry choir of Grace church under Professor Hall having quit because the rector, Rev. Dr. Thomas E. Greche, late candidate for bishopric of Iowa, publicly criticized the singers Sunday morning. The choir and organist say the rector was angry because a soprano turned about in the stall and faced the audience.

War Against Scalpers. DES MOINES, Feb. 8.—The principal question for discussion at the annual convention of the Iowa Marble and Granite Dealers' association, which opened in this city today, is how the marble and granite dealers of the state may secure protection against the itinerant canvassers who are abroad in the land. The dealers will not ask for legislation, but they hope to so thoroughly perfect their organization that the day of the marble "scalpers" in the state will soon be relegated to the past.

Scheme of Swindler Arrested. INDEPENDENCE, Ia., Feb. 7.—The office of the Northwestern Library association of this city was yesterday placed in the hands of the sheriff and F. W. Marsden, the manager, will be arrested. Marsden opened up here a month ago. He employed five stenographers and ran everything free and easy. He has 100 agents scattered over the state, whom he owes from \$20 to \$50. Each agent sent him \$15 for an outfit trunk, which has never been sent. Six attachments were filed today. Many worthless checks of his are afloat.

Iowa Saloons Again Closing. DES MOINES, Feb. 7.—The saloons in this city are again closing, having been instructed that they are given no protection by the stay order of the supreme court. This was understood to be a general order applying to all saloons operating under void consent petitions. Now it develops the order was intended to have no general effect and applies only to the case in which it was issued. Several wholesale liquor houses removed their stocks to places of safe keeping so they could not be ordered destroyed. In the legislature Senator Hubbard of Sioux City has submitted an outline of curative legislation.

SMALLPOX GERMS IN KISSES. Charles Frank Attends Church Social and Distributes Disease. DES MOINES, Feb. 6.—Charles Frank of Carpenter, Ia., attended a church social just across the state line in Minnesota a few days ago. During a kissing game he bestowed kisses on three young women of the church. Shortly afterward he was taken down with smallpox. So were all the young women. Eight cases have resulted in all, and one death has occurred. The state board of health was notified of the existence of smallpox and has ordered a quarantine.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS. Sir Edmund J. Monson, British ambassador to France, has arrived at San Remo, Italy.

Emperor William Thursday received Simar, the new archbishop of Cologne, who took the oath of homage.

The American hospital ship Maine, filled with wounded soldiers, started Thursday from Durban for Capetown.

The sum of £20,000, the balance of £60,000 stolen at London from Parr's bank a year ago, has been mysteriously returned.

The wheat harvest of South Australia is estimated to be six bushels per acre, leaving an exportable surplus of 185,000 tons.

The resignation of Harper S. Cunningham, territorial attorney general of Oklahoma, was accepted Thursday by Governor Barnes.

HAYWARD CHOSEN COLONEL

Succeeds Campbell at the Head of the Second Nebraska. LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 9.—Major W. H. Hayward of Nebraska City was declared colonel of the Second regiment, Nebraska national guard, after a canvass of the vote at the adjutant general's office. Thirty-six votes were cast, one being thrown out on account of a missing signature. Hayward received 17 votes; Captain Eli Hodgins, Company G, Omaha, 12; Lieutenant Colonel E. H. Tracy, 6.

Major Hodgins succeeds Colonel Campbell, who resigned.

COULD NOT FACE DISGRACE.

Audubon Man Commits Suicide When Arrested on a Forgery Charge. AUDUBON, Ia., Feb. 9.—Al Sheets committed suicide last night, taking his own life. He had been dealing on the Chicago board of trade for some years, and early this week it was learned he had floated numerous notes, which were forged, to obtain money, which his losses during the last two weeks put him in need of. He was arrested last evening and the sheriff permitted him to go to his home to see his wife before going to jail. While there he took the poison and died in about an hour.


Northern Iowa in Path of Storm. FORT DODGE, Feb. 9.—One of the worst blizzards that has visited northern Iowa in many years, struck this section Wednesday night. The temperature fell several degrees in a few minutes and a northwest wind blew a gale. Much suffering is reported throughout northern Iowa. Live stock interests are greatly injured and business practically is suspended until the storm subsides.

Butter and Egg Dealers Meet. DES MOINES, Feb. 9.—The butter and egg dealers of Iowa met here in state convention yesterday, there being some 30 delegates present. The old officers were re-elected. They are: President, H. Rhinesberger of Peola; secretary, William Verry of Des Moines. The association adjourned to meet again on March 22, it being customary to meet frequently during the spring.

Fatal Collision Between Passenger and Freight at Donnan Station. DUBUQUE, Ia., Feb. 8.—A head-end collision between a passenger train going north and a freight train occurred yesterday on the Calmar division of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul at Donnan station. Fireman Hamble of the passenger train was killed. Engineer Schaeffer of the passenger was badly scalded. S. C. Wynman of Waucoma had a leg crushed and it is thought it must be amputated. Several others suffered injuries but none seriously. Both engines and several cars were wrecked. The mishap was owing to dense fog.
