IMPORTANT RULING.

Orders for Payment of Money on Banks Even When Charged to Depositor Must Have a Two Cent Affixed. The revenue department has made an important ruling in regard to the responsibility for war revenue stamps which will affect nearly every branch of trade either directly or indirectly. It holds that receipts for insurance premiums, gas, water, telephone bills, and the like when paid by banks and charged to depositors' accounts, must have a two cent stamp affixed thereto as orders for payment of money. The official ruling is as follows: Treasury Department, Office of Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C.—Sir: This office is in receipt of your letter of January 9, 1900 in which you refer to office letter addressed to you under the date of December 21, 1899, relative to the exemption from tax receipts for insurance premiums when presented to and paid by banks and charged to the accounts of depositors, and state that through out your district insurance companies, gas companies, water companies, and in fact, all institutions transacting business where bills or dues are collectible monthly, have adopted the plan, where their patrons do not object, of presenting the bills or dues to the banks in which the patrons keep their accounts, where they are paid and charged to the patrons' accounts, and in view of the widespread use of this method you think that all such receipts or bills, when cashed by banks and charged to depositors' accounts, should be stamped as orders for the payment of money. You are advised that in view of the widespread use of the method above referred to, this office hereby rules that receipts for insurance premiums, monthly gas, water or telephone bills and, in fact, all similar receipts or bills, when cashed by a bank and charged to depositors' accounts, must have affixed thereto a two cent stamp as orders for the payment of money. This applies not only when such bills or receipts are cashed by a bank at the request of the depositor, but also when cashed by a bank without any expressed authorization from the depositor, but with his implied authority, as shown by his acquiescence. All former rulings contrary to the above are hereby revoked. Respectfully, G. W. Wilson, Commissioner.

TELEGRAMS TERSELY TOLD.

There are persistent reports that the Colombian insurgents are closing in upon Bogota for the purpose of forcing a crisis. The officials of the American Anti-Imperialist league, which organization has its headquarters in Chicago, are looking after close congressional districts. The New York presbytery Monday decided by a vote of 77 to 39 not to try Dr. Arthur G. McGiffert of the Union Theological seminary on the charge of heresy. Lord Curzon, the viceroy of India, says that the distress arising from the famine is steadily increasing and that those now in receipt of relief number 3,764,000. According to a dispatch from Brussels, Belgium and France intend to protest any treaty which would completely hand over the Nicaragua canal to the United States alone. After 680 salesmen had been examined, the 12 jurors to try the 12 Illinois miners charged with murdering five negroes on the steamer of Cartersville, on Sept. 17 last, were secured. All are farmers.
